NORTH-EASTERN BOUNDARY.—S. B. Barrell, Esq. has made his Report on the difficulties existing on this frontier. This gentleman, it may be recollected, was the Agent appointed by the United States to inquire respecting the alleged aggressions of the rights of American citizens, by the Authorities of New Brunswick, on the territory in dispute between the United States and Great Britain.

At Houlton Plantation, a settlement within the acknowledged bounds of Maine, Mr. Barrell met with several of the settlers on the Aroostook river. From these, who appear to be men of intelligence, he received the information he had in view, which rendered it unnecessary to proceed to the Aroostook settlement itself, as he had first ascertained.

Madawaska, to which Mr. B. proceeded from Houlton Plantation, was first settled soon after the treaty of 1763, by fifty-one Frenchmen, to whom in 1790, as many lots of land were granted. A second grant was made of 3252 acres, in 1774. These, with one of 250 acres, in 1825, are the only grants of land ever made by the British government.

was improper—and I wish it also to be distinctly understood, that I do not say, he did not confide any thing to me which should injure him." And this he repeated with much solemnity and emphasis. When called upon by Mr. Brown to come out and state all he knew; he replied, that he presumed the gentleman was not authorized by Mr. Clay to call him out, and he should not divulge any thing unless upon a call by the authority of Mr. Clay—that he had committed to writing what had passed between them, so that he would be able to communicate it. How men! It was as much as if one gentleman should say to another in a public company,—"sir, when we were friends you said things to me in the confidence of private friendship which are discreditable to your character; but I shall not tell them unless you call upon me to do it."

Flagrant Case.—Mr. George Locher, accompanied by his attorney, George W. Niven, Esq. came before the sitting magistrate, Mr. Wyman, and solicited his assistance under the following circumstances. On the 12th December, 1825, in Washington, Maryland, Mr. L. and one John Adams jointly became security for two persons in a bond for the payment of \$500.

Civil process has been occasionally issued against the settlers upon the Aroostook by British magistrates for three or four years past, and during the late summer process for trespass and intrusion was issued at the instance of the Attorney General of the province of New Brunswick, against the settlers generally, who were compelled to go to Frederickton and employ counsel in their defence. These suits are still pending.

Large Tree.—About 14 miles from Pittsburg, on the banks of the Ohio, stands a sycamore-tree in which a family, consisting of seven persons, resided all winter, having been detained by the freezing over the river while ascending it. In this tree they found room for all the necessary furniture and cooking utensils, having a fire in the centre, the smoke of which ascended through a hole in the trunk.

PANORAMA EXHIBITION. THE great Panoramic picture of the City of Paris, the Capital of the Kingdom of France is now exhibiting in the building on the public square of Rampart street.

The view is taken from the roof of the south end of the palace of the Tuilleries; the spectator must therefore imagine himself placed on this elevated situation which commands an extensive prospect over the whole city. Immediately under the eye of the spectator in a northern direction, is the roof of the King's apartments, and on the rights that of the long picture gallery stretching eastward as far as the Louvre.—This gallery bounds the place de Carrousel on the south side and the new gallery on the north, in the centre of this square is seen the triumphal arch. On this square Banaparte was wont to review his battalions previous to their departure for their respective destinations, and here oft the walls resounded with the clang of martial music. On the west side of the palace the spectator looks down on the Garden of the Tuilleries, and beyond that in the distance is seen the palace of the Garde de Meubles, and the woods of the Champ-Elysees in the distance.
