Jamaica.—The sugar crop had com menced, and a luxuriant harvest was an ticipated; but the coffee plantations yielded very short of their usual supply. The merchants of Jamaica, at their mesting on the 22d of January, determined that the freight of sugar to England should be reduced from 5s. 6d. to 5s.

New South Wales .- Dismal accounts are given of the state of Agriculture in New South Wales. The wheat crops have not only failed in many districts, but there is hardly a place in the whole colony where good pasturage or grazing land is to be met with. In most parts of Argyle vegetation is burnt up for want of rain.

Exports of Cotton Goods.—The Man chesret Herald of Thursday publishes a statement, extracted from the published return of the official and declared value of cotton and other manufactured goods, expo ted during the last and preceding vears. The rapid growth of our export trade will however, says the Herald, be most apparent by comparing the return of last year with one a few years older. The year 1816 was a year of great speculation, and the exports are so large as O produce a serious diminution in the demand of the following year; the official value of goods exported, during the vear 1819, being 4,327,456/. less than that for the year 1818. Yet it will be seen that the oficial value of cotton goods exported, during the year 1828, exceeds that of the year 1818 by nearly 50 per eent.! Judging from the appearance of the export trade, since the commencement of the present year, we do not entertain a doubt that it will be found as much to exceed in value that of the same period last year, as that of the spring 1827 exceeded that of 1826. We are glad to find that there has also been a considerable improvement in the export of linens and wooliens. The official value of linens exported last year was 2,859,7751. being an increase to the amount of 814,327%. The export of woollens amounted to 5,224,546/. being 814,170% above the export of the year

Invitation to the Faculty.- An official nvitation to English Surgeons to enter the Russian service appeared in the Lancet of Saturday. "It is quite astonishing how much depends upon coffee and tobacco in Persia. Men are gratified or offended, according to the mode in which three fa vourite refreshments are offered. You welcome a visitor or send him off, by the way in which you call for a pipe or a cup of coffee. Then you mark in the most minute manner every shade of attention and consideration, by the mode in which he is treated. If he be above you, you present refreshments yourself and do not partake till commanded; if equal, you exchange pipes, and present him with coffee, taking the next cup yourself; if a little below you, and you wish to pay him attention, you leave him to smoke his own pipe; but the servant gives him, according to your condescending nod, the first cup of coffee: if much inferior, you keep your distance and maintain your rank, by taking the first cup of coffee yourself, and then direct the servant, by a wave of the hand to help the guest. Smyrna, Feb. 18.—Piracy has considerably diminished in the months of November, December, and January. Most of the Greek armed vessels returned into port either to repair or to winter, and alarmed by the threats of the Admirals. We have heard only of eight ships plundered during that pe riod, viz. five Austrian, two French, n-d one Ionian.

From Africa .- We learn from Capt. Stevens, of the brig Mary Ann, from the island of Zinzibar, Africa, that the Sultan of Muscat arrived there about the middle of January, in a ship of the line, (the Liverpool) with two frigates, two gun brigs and a great number of armed transports, with 500 troops from Mombas and Palks, having subdued both places. He is, therefore, now in possession of all the principal ports from the Isle of Socotora to Cape Del Gado. namely; Socotora, Magadoob, Brava, Lamo, Palta, Monhee, Isles of Pemba Zanguebar, Quiton, &c. Melenda is no more. The walls of the houses only remaining, having been destroyed many years since.
