PANORAMA EXHIBITION.

THE great Panoramic picture of the
City of Paris, the Capital of the
Kingdom of France, is now exhibiting
in the building on the public square of
Rampart street.

The view is taken from the roof of
the south end of the Palace of the Tuileries;
the spectator may therefore easily

imagine himself placed on this ele-
vated situation which commands an ex-
tensive prospect over the whole city.

Immediately under the eye of the
spectator in a northern direction, is the
roof of the King's apartments, and on
the right that of the long picture gallery
stretching eastward as far as the Louvre.

This gallery bounds the place de la
Concorde on the south side and the new
square, the latter in St. Peter street, between
Charrue and Levee streets, & in the same house formerly occupied by
