PANORAMA EXHIBITION.

THE great Panoramic picture of the
City of Paris, the Capital of the
Kingdom of France, is now exhibiting
in the building on the public square of
Rampart street.
The view is taken from the roof of
the south end of the palace of the Tuil-
leries, the spectator must therefore
imagine himself placed on this ele-
vated situation which commands an ex-
tensive prospect over the whole city.
Immediately under the eye of the
spectator in a northern direction, is the
roof of the King's apartments, and on
the right that of the long picture gallery
stretching eastward as far as the Louvre;
—This gallery bounds the place de Car-
rousel on the south side and the new
gallery on the north, in the centre of
this square is seen the triumphal arch.
On this square Banaparte was wont to
review his battalions previous to their
departure for their respective destina-
tions, and here off the walls resound-
ed with the clang of martial music. On
the west side of the palace the specta-
tor looks down on the Gardens of the
Tuileries, and beyond that in the dis-
tance is seen the palace of the Garde de
Meubles, and the woods of the Champ
Elysees in the distance.

When we consider that Paris has
been the theatre of so many great polit-
ical events which have convulsed Eu-
rope for thirty years past few, if any
subjects of equal interest for a picture
could be offered to the public.
