SOUTHERN VOTERS.

We are informed that in one of the districts of South Carolina there are 258 persons, of whom about twenty are females, whose negro votes are sufficient to elect three members of Congress. The vote of these 258 persons, is therefore equal to 105,000 Pennsylvania Barren! And the vote of each man is equal to about 400 of our citizens. And yet these Southern gentlemen are in a treasonable commotion because their sovereignty is abridged; because they have not an all powerful voice in Congress;—and because we did not properly appreciate the majority of their negro people at the last presidential election.—[Harrisburgh Argus]

Gen. Jackson's Ordinances in Florida.—We had intended to publish some weeks since, a series of numbers, which have appeared in the National Intelligencer, reviewing Gen. Jackson's acts as Governor of Florida, but have hitherto been prevented. We advert to the subject at the present time to remark on the utter insufficiency of the defence which has been set up. In the words of the Courier of yesterday, it is, "that no blame can attach to Gen. Jackson in this matter; in as much as he most undoubtedly did as well as he was capable of doing;" and "that no act of importance was ordained—except by and with the advice of and consent of others—who had no official right"—(of course no official responsibility,) "to speak in the matter." Who these unauthorized law-makers were, appears from a letter of Judge Breckenridge, of Pensacola: the Judge states that the framing of the ordinances was committed by Gen. Jackson to Mr. Duncan and himself: if blame should attach any where, it should be upon them; and the Judge professes never to have understood why they were repealed by Congress. The only supposition he makes is, that Congress was most unaccountably dull of apprehension and ignorant. With regard to Gen. Jackson's part in this concern the Judge says, "the truth is, he entrusted the task to us as civilians; confided in our abilities, and was actuated by no other motives than a desire to discharge his duties in the most satisfactory manner to the President and the Inhabitants of the Territory." So far was this confidence carried, that the ordinance respecting naturalization, which was framed by Mr. Duncan alone, was sanctioned by Gen. Jackson "with some reluctance," that is against his own better judgment.

Fellow citizens of every name, we entreat you to pause, and consider this development by one who "feels a strong attachment to Gen. Jackson." Are you willing to count for nothing this new admission of incompetency for civil office. Are you willing to entrust the management of the varied and intricate concerns of this wide spread Union to a man who entrusted the management of the affairs of a single province to persons, in whom was vested no official responsibility? Are you willing to aid the elevation of Andrew Jackson to the Presidency, with such portentous uncertainty whether he will yield himself to the dictation of the Anti Tariff and Anti Improvement politicians at the South, or to the more dubious and equivocal guidance of Martiz Van Buren and his colleagues? The question is no longer, after these disclosures, between Adams and Jackson, but between Adams and his administration, and the Cabinet Gen. Jackson may select: he himself will entrust all grave matters of state to them "AS CIVILIANS."

Extract of a letter from an officer of the U. S. Navy, dated RIO DE JANEIRO, June 19. "We have been doing harder duty here within the last twelve months than a Kennebec coaster. The commotion is apprehensive, I believe, that the scurvy may attack us, and accordingly keeps us sailing between this and the river, as regularly as if we belonged to a packet line. I believe that the young men on board now feel themselves competent to act as a branch pilot between this and Montevideo. We are all well, in good spirits, and waiting patiently to be relieved."

British Fortifications.—The Montreal Gazette states, that the British Government have appropriated the sum of five millions to be expended on the fortifications and public works in Canada.

Improvements in Canada.—We learn from the Montreal Gazette, that since the visits of the Commissioners to the Rideau Canal, the works which had been suspended are resumed, and that the expenditure on the works this season will be greater than in the last. The locks at Bytown are to be laid 134 feet in length, and 33 in breadth, so as to admit the passage of steam boats of considerable tonnage. Other locks are to be constructed of the same dimensions along the Grenville Canal, and when the line is completed, the small locks already erected are to be taken down, and enlarged. The paper adds, "Thus when the Welland Canal is completed, large vessels and steam boats will be enabled to sail without interruption from the heads of the Upper Lakes to the upper end of the Lachine Canal, which at present admits Durham boats of the largest class through. The locks on the latter canal could be easily enlarged, and at no very distant period vessels from the ocean may yet carry the peaceful commerce and display the meteor flag of Great Britain on the waves and shores of the Erie, the Huron, and the Michigan."

The Pruthi.—So often mentioned of late, is a river in Moldavia, running for the first half of its course, in a south easterly direction, and for the other half, in a southerly, till it falls into the Danube from 80 to 90 miles from its mouth.—While the Pruthi continues its south easterly course, it divides ancient Moldavia nearly in half; after taking its southern direction, it is the boundary between that principality, and the Russian frontier now extends to the Pruth; the principality of Moldavia is no longer bounded by the Dniester, as it appears in most maps, but has the Pruth for its north eastern boundary, and the Russian armies lie, we presume not in Poland but in the part of Moldavia on the left bank of the Pruth, acquired by Russia. The distance to Constantinople from the confluence of the Pruth and Danube, (to which point the Russian frontier extends) is about two hundred and fifty miles by water, and two hundred by land, in a direct line.

PATCH-WORK. Yesterday afternoon Samuel Patch, who performed the famous leap at Paterson Falls, undertook to execute a similar feat at Hoboken. From five to six hundred spectators assembled on the green before Van Buskirk's Hotel, and the water was covered with that full of people. A sloop was moored at a little distance from the shore, and a platform was erected at mast head on which Patch took his station. It was estimated to be about ninety feet from the surface of the water. After it was judged that a proper number of spectators had assembled, Patch leaped from the platform into the water, and was taken up without having received any other injury than a bruise on one of his eyes.—[N. Y. paper.]

Stage accident.—On Wednesday, the 30th ult. as the stage from this place to Wooster (Ohio), was passing a thick piece of woods, a short distance south of the village of Medina, during the violence of a storm, a large tree fell and killed three of the horses attached to the stage, without injuring any of the passengers or the stage driver, more than the fright occasioned by their dangerous situation. There were three passengers in the stage at the time, two of whom, Mrs. Weddell and Miss Wood, were from this village, on their way to Newark.—[Cleveland (Ohio) pa.]

A writer in the Black River Gazette suggests a novel experiment for the suppression of intemperance "at one fell swoop."

"Think I to myself, the other day, it would be best to buy a large quantity of whiskey, and get all the drunkards in town together, and let them drink and drink until they destroyed themselves. They should be shut up in a large yard, like a pound, with a fence four feet high, over which they could not climb; and then be fed in troughs; and they should be always kept there, that they might not go about, as a bad example to sober people. They should have no intercourse with the hogs, or any respectable living beings. Parents should go once or twice a year with their children, and look over the fence and tell their children, "that red faced monster was once a man—but whiskey has changed him into a brute."

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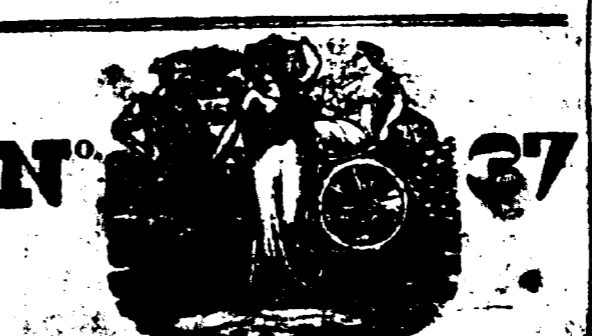
