NEW ORLEANS: WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 1829.

Very late from France. We have received by the ship Phoenix, from Havre, Paris papers up to the 24th of December.

Their contents have been principally anticipated by the last arrivals from Liverpool; but we have selected such matter as is most likely to interest, and by which it will appear that the retiring of the Russians is entirely owing to the season, and that Varna is not besieged by the Turks...

Room the preparations said to be making for a descent on Algiers, it is reasonable that the French Government is determined to make a decisive effort for the suppression of outrages which it has so long born with from those insulting its flag.

PARIS, Dec. 24.—A serious attack on Algiers, is still seriously spoken of, and is likely to take place next Spring.

At Toulon, they are now constructing Bomb-vessels on a new plan, said to be almost of a round form, and will be used in the expected attack on Algiers. We know that a considerable part of artillery has been ordered to be sent to Toulon.

(From London and Paris Journals.) The manner in which His Majesty's ministers have been received on two recent and important occasions, must serve materially to prove, if proof were necessary, the utter unworthiness of those libelers who would fain represent them as not possessing the entire confidence of the nation.

Next then comes the question—Has the war ended? For the present at least it must be; the Russian treasury, if not exhausted, is nearly in the extreme; and the recruiting, however easy of accomplishment in barbarous and despotic countries, cannot be rendered available without the sinews of war being forthcoming.
