Virginia is occupied with designating her ablest men for seats in the approaching Convention. Among others, Mr. Madison was proposed—but, says the Richmond Whig, "all the State has to regret his declining to serve in the Convention." In the 79th year of his age, he conceives himself unequal to the discharge of duties so arduous, and (we may add) to encounter the kindness and attention which his presence in Richmond would attract.

Progress of Manufactures.—Messrs. E. B. Hagan & Co. of B. Brown, (Ky.) have nearly completed an extensive Cotton Factory. The business of spinning will commence in a few weeks, with 200 spindles. The building is sufficiently large to receive 1200 spindles, and the proprietors intend to connect with it the requisite machinery, &c. for manufacturing cotton goods.

The Newbury Gazette of yesterday informs us that, about 11 o'clock, the Powder Mills of Daniel Rogers, Esqr. about four miles northwest of that village, were blown up. The explosion was tremendous, shaking the village to its foundation. Four men are missing, supposed to have been killed; the mutilated remains of two have been found scattered throughout the woods near the mills.—N. Y. Amer. 17th March.

The appointing power is hard at work in Washington. But one principle seems to prevail—that of rewarding personal fidelity to Gen. Jackson; that the all-sufficient qualification; and lacking that, though possessed of every other requisite, the candidate lacks every thing. Economy and the public interest are alike disregarded. Take, for instance, the appointment of Mr. Moore, of Kentucky, to succeed Gen. Harrison as Minister to Colombia. Gen. Harrison sailed from this port in November last, and is yet scarcely warm in his residence at Bogota; he is in all parts the superior of Mr. Moore. As a soldier his services, particularly at the Moravian Towns, may well compare with the most brilliant of those of Gen. Jackson; as a Senator of the United States, he held for many years a most respectable rank among able colleagues. Of Mr. Moore's services nothing has ever transpired, except the integrity with which he used, during the late contest, the privilege of franking—granted for specific purposes to members of Congress—to convey to the Western States bushels of Washington Telegraphs, electioneering handbills, &c. So much for the bill of fare. The economy of this proceeding is not less remarkable, seeing that an income tax successor is to be sent at an expense of \$18,000, to take the place of an efficient man, and who has already become entitled to that compensation—thus making the expenditure for one year, and for one mission \$36,000.

The offices of the general government are now, it seems to be conceded, only to be viewed as rewards for partisan service. One striking instance, in the case of Mr. Baylies, of Massachusetts, was mentioned on Saturday.—The list of to-day presents a precisely analogous one in the case of Mr. Parker, appointed Collector of Perth Amboy—an excellent appointment by the way. Mr. Parker was a Jackson elector in 1824. It is, however, but just to say that, hitherto, there have been no removals in what may be called the subordinate—though highly respectable and responsible offices under the government. In the custom house, post offices, &c. the recent appointments are all in cases where the commissions of the incumbents had expired, or vacancies existed. The re-appointment of Mr. Ferguson, the present capable naval officer of this port, completes the organization of our Custom House, and we may pronounce, without much risk of mistake, that in it there will be no changes for the present.—N. Y. American.

foot of the Balkan, and only waiting for the Emperor's nod to storm the hills, sweep over Ruvette, and, with scarcely the formality of a siege, walk into Constantinople. But then came the Turks, armed and raw, "yet not to be driven from their ground by bullets; and the Russian battalions rapidly felt the march to Constantinople must be postponed. The labours of a whole campaign have issued in the capture of a single fortress, whose fall is imputed to treachery, and whose maintenance in the hands of the captors is already threatened. On all other points the "Grand Russian Army," the choice of the whole force of the empire, and, probably, the whole disposable force of the empire, has been shamefully beaten. Their own bulletins, which, of course, soften the disaster as much as possible, are compelled to acknowledge tremendous losses. We have accounts of the staff of armies grouped together in Jassy and Bucharest, without a soldier of those armies; colonels, in all directions, without regiments; brigades of artillery without a gun; hordes of cavalry without a horse; cannon buried, wounded deserted, hospitals crowded, great armies left behind, to fight their way back if they can, and, probably, long since broken up, and in the enemy's hands; that enemy pouring on in increasing force, and with the spirit of victory; and the Russians still flying, with the Imperial Guard leading the flight, and the Emperor a thousand miles from the field. It is computed that their three months campaign has cost the Russians not less than sixty thousand men slain, dead of distemper, or disabled by wounds and hardships. But the scarcely less evident proofs of failure are to be found in the rapid changes of the imperial officers. The largest intelligence states, that, after frowning down some half dozen of the highest rank, and, among others, the generalissimo, the Emperor despatched an order to the general commanding in Armenia, to take the charge of the Moldavian army, and retrieve its fortunes if he can. The case must be all but hopeless, which resorts to expedients like this, and runs the risk of disgracing the chief officers of his army for the sake of trying how far the character of a rabble of the loose cavalry and half-naked infantry of the limits of Asia Minor may be able to stand against the force of European Turkey fighting under the eye of the Sultan. [Monthly Magazine.

Capacity for Freedom.—One of the grand absurdities of my nation of philosophers is to think that the same liberty is made for all mankind. They might as well think that the same pair of pantaloons were made for all man-kind among you—but the tree will never throw out a leaf. You have not the soil. There are, I know, even in Italy, individuals of fine ability and generous dispositions; but the people want the mind, the morals, and the habits for freedom.

They are graceful, clever, and utterly unprincipled—a tarantula people; a spider bites them into frenzy and a tane on the field brings them round again. But liberty is no masquerade; it is a thing of solemn thought, noble literature, and lofty principle.—Its birth is in throes; but if the public frame have been already weakened by profligacy, the birth is in madness or death. It requires us to be prepared for the sternest sacrifices—fortune, fame, and life must be ready to be laid upon its altars. But those sacrifices will be made only by a high-principled and pore-minded people. The nation of husbands and fathers must love the nation of wives and children, before they will perseveringly face death for the honor of the one or the security of the other.

Religion, honesty, a sense of the sacredness of home, and a solemn and hallowed habit of reliance on that invisible will which finally fights the battle of the righteous cause, must be the principles of the nation, before it can valiantly and wisely meet the tremendous penalties of a struggle for freedom. Popular fury may sweep down old encumbrances; but it is only to raise others more oppressive. The hissing stream of public vengeance may burst over its banks, and hurry their pollution down; but the torrent soon stagnates, and has only added the new pollution to the old, mingled them into more living evil, and left them to infect the world together. "Perseverance in struggle, and self-denial in success," is the true motto for the banners of a people that would win and wear their liberty.—[Tales of the Great St. Bernard.]
