Law against Embezzlement.—We have been favored with a copy of the law in England "to prevent the embezzlement of securities for money and other effects left and deposited for safe custody, or other special purpose, in the hands of bankers, merchants," &c. It provides that if any banker, &c. shall sell, negotiate, transfer, assign, pledge, embezzle, secret, or in any manner apply such money, &c. to his own use and benefit, with intent to defraud the owner or owners, he "shall be deemed and taken to be guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted according to law, shall be sentenced to transportation for any term not exceeding fourteen years, or to receive such other punishment as may by law be inflicted on a person or persons guilty of a misdemeanor, and as the Court before which such offender or offenders may be tried and convicted shall adjudge."

FROM HALIFAX.—The Nova Scotian, speaking of the \$200 appropriation of Congress for the relief of Baker, says—"Really the American Government lessens its own dignity, without adding to its claim on the territory, by patronizing such a fellow."

The Society for the encouragement of Fisheries have resolved to apply to the Legislature for aid, for the purpose of establishing a more general Society for that purpose.

The number of vessels arriving at Nova Scotia during the last year, is stated at 1777; and the amount of tonnage, 135,126. The value of imports for the same is estimated at 985,430.

From the Norfolk Herald.

Distressful scene.—Washington N. Smith, of New York, who states that his mother resides near the corner of Broad-way and Grand street, N. Y. arrived here on Thursday evening last, and reports that he was one of the crew of the brig *Clarissa Ann*, of N. w. York, brought by Mr. John Barr, of that city, which sailed from Cuba with a cargo consisting of sugar and molasses, bound to New-York; that the said brig was cast away off Cape Hatteras, on the night of the 20th Feb. between 7 & 8 o'clock, and immediately after she struck, the mate Mr. Edwin Smith, our informant, and a coloured man jumped overboard, to swim ashore—the two latter succeeded in the attempt, but Mr. S. was drowned.

The Captain (Smith, who belonged to N. York, and 4 seamen, had been previously swept overboard in a gale, and were lost. Our informant adds, that the brig afterwards got off, and was seen by him next morning about half a mile distant from where she struck, full of water, drifting out to sea. We have not seen the coloured man, one of the survivors, who arrived here with W. N. Smith.

A gentleman who came down James river on Friday last, informs that he saw a schr. ashore at James Town supposed to be the *Britannia* of Old Point—from her appearance, he had no doubt was bilged. He also saw a schr. ashore opposite the mouth of Williamsburg Creek, and one supposed to be ashore at Hog Island.

Trial for Libel.—On Monday, at the Municipal Court in this city, came on the trial of the editor of a paper, lately removed hither from Providence, called the *Anti-Universalist*, for a libel on the character of George B. Beals, deceased.

The proceedings in the case were interesting, on account of the nature of the matter charged as libellous, it being a contradiction of an obituary notice published in *The Trumpet*, a Universalist paper. The *Anti-Universalist* said, the deceased was "habituated to profanity"—but that he died penitent. The prosecuting officer contended, that this was a needless defamation calculated to injure the feelings of the living friends, and the reputation of the dead; and that it was not done for any good motive, but for the purpose of making a public quarrel with the *Trumpet*, and adding to the sale of the *Anti-Universalist*. The defence was, that the accusation was true, and that it was made with the view of correcting the misrepresentation of the *Trumpet*.

After a tedious examination, which continued for two days, the Jury returned a verdict of *Not Guilty*.

This case derives additional interest from the strenuous attempt of the defendant, to have Universalists excluded from the right of taking an oath.—The witnesses being all Universalists on

the part of the Government, he labored to have them rejected from the stand; but the Court overruled the objection, deciding that, "if a man believed in the existence of a God, who would reward the good and punish the wicked, he had all the qualifications required by law for admission as a witness or juror, though proof might be brought, concerning his religious opinions, as matters to discredit his testimony."

(Boston Palladium.)

The Boston Commercial Gazette says:—"A feeble old man, (76 years of age) poor, though respectable, has recently been taken and imprisoned on a writ for three hundred dollars, by his own SON-IN-LAW, (who married his only daughter) to whom he does not, he says, owe a single cent."

COMETS.—It is calculated by the celebrated astronomer, Eucke, that the comet now moving within the solar system will, at the expiration of two hundred and nineteen millions of years, come in contact with our earth; and of course, one or the other must be destroyed. The length of time before this will take place renders it unnecessary for us to caution the old ladies to be prepared for the rub. The Comet alluded to is the only one ever discovered whose orbit is confined within the solar system. Some astronomers ascribe the present favourable temperature of the weather to its influence.
