FROM HAVANA.—Capt. Ma-william, who arrived at Charleston from Havana on the 11th of March, bringing papers to the 7th—reports that up to the time of his leaving, there had been no more piracies, and that the cruizers which had gone in pursuit of the pirates had not returned. He also states a report to have been in circulation, though not much credited, of a Hamburg vessel having been taken by the pirates.

PANAMA INSTRUCTIONS.—The National Journal of Friday contains the "Instructions to the Ministers of the U. S. at Panama," which were communicated to the Senate on the 2d March; refused to be printed by that body, and transferred from the Legislative to the Executive journal—but restored by a resolution of Monday last. They make 8 1-2 close-printed columns.

LONDON, Feb. 2.
[From the correspondents of the N. Y. Jour. Com.]
I must first refer to the sudden departure of Prince de Polignac. I have to state that he, at present, does not form a part of the French Ministry, but the precise occasion of the change has not been made known. The Prince, however, since his arrival, has had repeated interviews with the King. England and France are on the best terms with each other; but Russia seems determined not to brook any restrictions with respect to the adjustment of the war with Turkey, which must be settled in her own way. So much for Nicholas. Count Maturzewitz, one of the principal Ministers of the Emperor of Russia, arrived here last Monday, and it is understood, is charged with an important mission from the Russian Emperor to our Government. His arrival creates much speculation in the political circles; but as yet, mere speculation. The most probable report is, that he brings a treaty for a pacification with the Turkish Government.

The affairs of Portugal are still in a state of high ferment, and the late accounts indicate a strong feeling in favor of Donna Maria, their lawful Queen.
The basis of Mr. Oflay's treaty, it is now ascertained, rested upon the free passage of the Dardanelles to all nations. This, as might be expected, met with an immediate rejection. It is not the power of the Ottoman government to make such a treaty; and other Powers, as every one must admit, would not allow such a treaty to be kept. No one doubts the benefit the United States might derive from such a course of commerce, particularly as they are striving to get up a market for the world, in their manufactures; but it must be considered, that France and England, to say nothing of Russia, are tenacious of their custom and commerce. These are observations made on 'Change; therefore, too much reliance must not be placed on the authenticity of the rumor.

NEW-YORK, March 24.
The schooner Splendid from Porto Cabello, having sailed on the 2d inst brings information, the correctness of which may perhaps be questioned, that the inhabitants of Peru, had declared themselves unfavorable to the war with Colombia, and favorable to the Liberator Bolivar. Gen. Padilla had been shot.

PIRACY.—It is stated in the Evening Post, that the President has ordered the Natchez to be sent to sea within 24 hours, to scour the coast of Cuba, in pursuit of pirates.

A letter, published in the Gazette of this morning, from an officer on board the Erie, says, that vessel was between Havana, and Matanzas, giving convoy to vessels, as required from either port; and adds, that the large boats of the Erie had been manned and provisioned for 15 days, and despatched to examine the coast for one hundred miles.

Under these circumstances, it is with some surprise we observe in the same paper, a remark importing that foreign ships of war "are willing to extend to us that protection which our own Navy appear unwilling to afford." Surely, it is but just to a navy that has never shrunk from any duty—not thus lightly to repeat the petulant complaint, perhaps suggested by some individual disappointment.—N. Y. Amer.

ABDUCTION OF STEPHENSON.—The Savannah papers of the 14th March, apprise us that the Governor of Georgia had petitioned to demand from the Governor of New-York, the

of Rowland Stephenson, he having been kidnapped when owing temporary allegiance to the Government of Georgia and protected by its laws." Mean time a *habeas corpus* having been granted, it was served upon Geo. Miller, Wm. James, and James C. Pierce, who, together with Wm. W. Oates, (who was not found, and who it is supposed accompanied Stephenson in the pilot-boat) were the kidnapers. The return to the writ by the three first named persons, was an admission of having taken Stephenson as stated; and that he was delivered into the custody of Oates, by whom he was placed on board of a vessel bound for New-York. Upon this return, they were discharged from their recognizances, under the *habeas corpus*; but are still under heavy bail to answer at the May Term for the kidnapping.

ROWLAND STEPHENSON, was yesterday discharged, by the Recorder, from arrest, at the suit of the agents under the commission of bankruptcy, in London, on the ground that no affidavit of debts was produced; and to day, in the matter of Parkin's suit, he was in like manner discharged from arrest, by the Superior Court, on the ground that having been illegally brought within the jurisdiction of this State, the process of the Court could not attach. So Rowland Stephenson is at large, and as the Courts of the United States have no jurisdiction in suits between aliens, he is in no danger from that quarter.

From Porto Cabello.—By the splendid Capt. Clark, which arrived here last evening from Porto Cabello, whence she sailed on the 2d inst. we learn that a decree of the Supreme Chief had arrived from Bogota, making several appointments to office to be held during his absence at Peru, whether he was going at the head of the army; the names of those appointed had not been made public. Directly after the receipt of the above the Governor of P. de Cabello published the following:

News has arrived that the inhabitants of Peru have declared themselves unfavorable to the war with Colombia, and in favor of the Liberator, in consequence of which the march of the Colombian troops towards Peru had been countermanded.

It is also said that part of the officers and soldiers were shortly to receive their retire, and that there would be no more drafts from the militia. It is not known whether Bolivar intends going to Peru or not. By a private letter it was understood that some of the Colombian officers engaged in the affair at Augustura are to be forthwith sent to Caracas, which it is presumed will be favorable.

A decree was in force at Lagaira and expected momentarily at Porto Cabello, quelling all descriptions of "Port Vals" which are to be taken at the different Custom Houses to the amount of part of duties due on all imports and to the full amount of export duties. Six per cent additional duty to be added on all imports which is returned to the importer on his exporting produce of the country, the duties on which amount to the said additional duty.

The frigate Columbia, Com. Chitty, had arrived at Porto Cabello with very few men. The Columbia and corvette Erie, Capt. Brown, were reported to sail for New-York soon, to repair. The latter vessel had lost her mainmast in heaving down at the wharf, and on the second trial filled and sunk, in which state she remained when the S. left, but it was expected she would be got up shortly.

The brig Native, Davis, of New Haven, was detained on suspicion of having been concerned in a contraband trade on the coast of Cumana. A favorable decision was shortly expected. The revenue department were very active in preventing smuggling, there are three prizes now in port, taken by the sloop Independencia, this sloop is constantly cruising along the coast on the look out. The crop of coffee is abundant and of very good quality, much of the crop will however be lost by the calling out of the militia, which principally consists of labourers, many of the plantations have been almost abandoned for want of labourers and capital.

The Police are very watchful; no person can go or come from the city without a passport, and if any householder receives in his house any person without giving immediate notice thereof to the police, he is fined 50 dollars. The officers and part of the crew of the private armed Buenos Ayrean brig Presidencia, who had been detained on board of the ship Ceres had been acquitted, but had demanded redress from the government for their unjust detention. A prize ship loaded with sugar, hides, &c. taken by the B. A. privateer Congress, Capt. Chase, was in port and her cargo expected to be sold immediately.
