INTERIOR.
It is our unpleasant duty, this week, to record the death of our old esteemed fellow-citizen, Capt. Joseph Erwin, of Iberville, which occurred last week, by *Suicide*—and a more extraordinary case of suicide has rarely come under our notice: In a fit of mental derangement (to which the deceased had of late been subject) as is supposed, he enveloped his head in a blanket, and plunged into a large water jar, head foremost, in which situation he was found lifeless—Capt. Erwin was a wealthy sugar planter of the adjacent parish; and those who have experienced his munificent hospitality, will long deplore the act of infatuation which led to his tragical end.

Charleston Courier—By a reference to our marine head, will be seen that the brig *Francis*, from Boston, bound for Havana, (one of the vessels missing at Havana, the latter end of March, and which was supposed to have fallen into the hands of pirates) was wrecked on Bermuda, and that the crew have arrived at Norfolk.—*Ibid.*

JOHN VAUGHAN has been recognized, by the president, as Vice Consul of his Majesty the Emperor of Brazil, for the State of Pennsylvania and Delaware, to reside at Philadelphia.

From the Gazette de France, dated Feb. 2.]—Paris Feb. 1.—It is affirmed that a loan of 25,000,000 has just been contracted by the Portuguese Government with a banking house at Paris. This loan it is said, will be paid by means of annuities, and will be secured upon one of the branches of the public revenue of that kingdom. The produce of the tax allotted to this payment is to be paid into the hands of the Contractors or their agents at Lisbon. It is thought that the farm of tobacco, or that of the wine of Oporto, will be selected for this purpose: so that the Contractor would be paid in this manner, not by the treasury, but by the farmer of the tax assigned for the purpose.

If we are well informed, this loan, to be repaid in 25 annuities, has been contracted for at the rate of 80 per cent.

The British Army.—A continental war at this period would throw Great Britain into great confusion, in relation to her army. The whole military force of that kingdom consists of 130 Regiments. Two thirds of this force are dispersed among the various British possessions, 24 Regiments in England—and what is extraordinary, 23 in Ireland—and only one in Scotland. Those in Ireland, it is presumed, cannot be removed at this unsettled period, and laying aside some difficulties as to money, there is no given point at which 50,000 men can be assembled for any important object.

French Navy.—During the reign of Napoleon, the army was the favorite, but still the navy was not neglected, though from the swarm of British cruisers, the tri-colored flag was seldom seen afloat. It seems to be the policy and desire of the French government, to pay great attention to the increase of the navy, and the improvement of this branch of the public defence cannot fail to excite attention. By a recent decree there will be in France 36 admirals, 110 post captains, 130 masters and commanders, 500 lieutenants, 550 midshipmen, with the proportion of other officers, seamen, naval schools, naval depot, &c. A navy to give employment to so many officers, would be nearly equal to that of the British, and it does appear that the "mistress of the ocean" cannot but see with uneasiness the bantlings of France, Russia, the United States, &c. which are multiplying in such swarms, and looking into the books and corners of every part of the globe.

A new article of Commerce.—We are told that in a certain steam-boat which arrived here not a thousand years since, came passengers 36 *game cocks*, in four boxes, of nine compartments each, for which \$360 were paid. They are in fine condition—having had their spurs cut, and ready to be steeled for battle. Their combs, wings and tails, are nicely trimmed and oiled; and in a few days they will be prepared to enter the lists with their fellow combatants.

These characters, we understand, were transported by land, over snow banks and through mud, from beyond Albany to Poughkeepsie, and thence by water to this city, that their feat might gratify the good people here, and wital—*See*

their pockets. At a proper time we may communicate further particulars.

It was a prosecution for breaking open a grave, in the public grave-yard, and doing violence to the corpse of a Stranger, who had just been interred, for the purpose of obtaining his teeth! Two persons were concerned in this scandalous affair; one of them only was brought to trial. He was convicted and fined 25 dollars.

You've been Captain long enough!
Walking up Beacon Street the other day, I met a little republican corps, which amused me greatly. The band consisted of four archins, from 6 to ten years old, accoutred in boyish style, with pasteboard caps and tin swords. The troop was merely large enough to furnish a Captain; Lieutenant, Ensign, and Trumpeter—a pretty fair epitome of some of our military establishments, all officers and no men. Being Americans, and all in office, I very naturally supposed they were satisfied and happy; but my eyes had not followed the young soldiers far, when I perceived their lieutenant, a sturdy chap about six years old, making a dead halt. "What's the matter, Bill?" called out the captain. "I tell you what, Ned, you've been captain long enough—I'm going to be captain now!" Some altercation ensued but the refractory lieutenant only vociferated the louder—"You've been captain long enough—It's my turn now!" A compromise was at length happily affected; and the ambitious young officer agreed to budge on a few yards further, with the promise of being made captain at the end of the street.

I laughed as the little pageant moved out of sight. "This," said I, "is an abridgement of human society—this is the genuine spirit of man." That little troop is frequently brought to my mind. When I hear politicians blustering about reform, and keeping up a perpetual noise about evils which every body hears of, and nobody feels—I say to myself, "Hah! your troop would be all officers; and even then the meanest little scape grace among ye, would soon rebel from his duty, and call out, 'I tell you what, Ned, it's my turn to be captain now!'"—*Mass. Journal.*

Great Explosion.—About three weeks ago, Squire Isaac Otis, contractor on Section 65 of the Delaware canal, a little below Point Pleasant, made a blast with 4 keps of gunpowder, about 100 lbs. blew up about 400 cubic yards of solid rock, which was estimated to weigh upwards of 600 tons. It was what was termed a *sand blast*, and is believed to be the greatest blast ever made in this country.—*Charleston Cour.*

Singular Being.—The following account of an idiot is in a French paper:—There is at Merit, in the department of the Oise, a farmer named Roger, who has a daughter now 20 years of age—an idiot. She has never had the power of speech and makes known her wants by cries which resemble a grunting; she is not deaf, is obedient to command and is mild in temper except when her wishes are not complied with, when she becomes quite furious. Whether sitting or lying, her head and hands are always in motion, and she destroys every thing that comes within her reach. Her face is not ugly, but it is without expression. She generally walks on all-fours, and in this position smells to every thing she meets with as brutes would do. Her food is clover lucerne, and other field vegetables, and she is also particularly fond of raw meat. She likes wine, but does not drink as we do. She knows her home perfectly, and frequently rambles in the fields.
