FROM KEY WEST.—We have received the Key West Register of April 16th. It contains numerous details respecting the Spanish Packet Correo No. 1, running between Havana and Cadiz, which was lost within about four miles of where the light-ship is usually stationed. A communication is inserted by the captain (Medina) in Spanish, with an English translation, in which he denies that the vessel's company who relieved his distress, "armed themselves at his instigation, to prevent a surprise from his sailors who contemplated rising upon the vessel and carrying her into Mantanzas." This statement is corroborated by several persons on board. There is also a communication from Captain Grover, of the said vessel, (the Native,) in which he affirms substantially what Capt. Medina denies, and subjoins a letter from Lieut. Truxton, of the Revenue Cutter Pulaski to the same effect. Both these communications had been previously published on extra sheets. The trial in the case of the Correo, on the question of salvage, came before the Court on the 11th inst. The Court awarded to the salvors two-fifths of the specific saved, one half the proceeds of the other articles, and the sum of \$200, as a compensation for saving the passengers & crew and such part of the cargo as they were able to obtain from the brig.

The evidence (says the Register) disclosed a case of great merit on the part of the wreckers; twenty-three persons were upon a raft drifting towards the Gulf Stream, without provisions or water, where they had been about twelve hours, and a short time after they were saved, it began to blow very heavy with a rough sea, and in all probability they would have perished during the night. The wrecking vessels, without delaying to save anything from the wreck, proceeded at every hazard, to save the lives of the passengers and crew, and with great feeling and gratuity to the passengers bore testimony to the kind and generous treatment of those who saved them, in supplying them with dry clothing and affording them every comfort in their power.

FROM EUROPE.

Rome, March 10. The Cardinals were assembling, preparatory to the election of a Pope. The eldest Cardinals must go into conclave within 10 days from the death of the Pope, and keep voting from day to day till a choice is made. It appears that on present occasion, Cardinal de Gregorio had at one time 24 votes, and came near being elected. The report of this was spread in the city, and the next morning a great crowd flocked to the Quirinal, expecting the declaration of the election. They were disappointed, however, for on the next day Cardinal G. had only 11 voices. Several Ambassadors attended the conclave, and presented their credentials. The Ambassador of the Netherlands was expected to be presented on the 11th, and this would be the first instance of the Ambassador of a Protestant power being accredited by a conclave.

that iron may be used for sheathing ships, without danger of rusting, if protected by plates of zinc. The improvement is thus described in the Register of Arts for April:

"The iron plates may be of the usual dimensions of the copper plates, and for each area of 100 inches in the iron, a plate of zinc, of from 1-2 to 1-4 inch thick, equal to 5 inches area, is attached to the lower extremity of the sheet, so that in sheathing the vessel from the upper part downwards, each succeeding sheet of iron shall be in contact by lapsing over with the zinc plate of the sheet above it. Plates of zinc must also be attached to the inside of the sheet of iron, bearing a proportion in area to those on the outside of 3 to 5. The spikes and bolts by which the sheathing is fastened to the vessel, are each to be furnished with a disc, or washer of zinc, fitting closely to the head, and it is recommended that they be driven well home, to ensure perfect metallic contact. The nails employed are to be made concave under the head, and the cavity is to be filled with melted zinc. By this mode of sheathing vessels, it is asserted that the corrosion or oxidation of the metal will be nearly if not effectually prevented."

A very successful attempt at kidnapping was undertaken by the Sheriff of the county, on Wednesday evening. A camp of seven negroes was surprised in the swamps several miles from town, and all of them taken into custody.

These runaway negroes are in the habit of visiting town after night; and it is highly probable that their apprehension may furnish some clue to the late incendiary attempts which have created so much alarm among us.
