We observed with pleasure the extreme alacrity evinced by the members to carry said proposition into effect. Yesterday the committee named for that purpose purchased the Portrait and immediately transmitted it, together with a very polite letter, to Madame Derbigny.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.
From London papers.
 LONDON, April 19.

The Royal Assent has been given to the Catholic Relief Bill, and thus ends this source of alarm to the timid, and of fraud to the designing. Of the thirty Bishops in Parliament, ten voted for the third reading, and twenty against it. The only Clerical Peer, Lord Nelson, joined the latter, and the head of the Navy, Lord Exmouth likewise opposed the Bill. The effect of the measure has been already beneficially felt in Ireland, and Government anticipates that it will so rapidly tranquilize the public mind, that they now take of reducing the military force in that country.

House of Commons, April 13.
CATHOLIC RELIEF BILL.—When the House informed the House that he had heard the Royal Assent given to the Catholic Relief Bill and the Freeholders' Qualification (Ireland) Bill, and several other, there was great cheering in the house for some time.

LONDON, April 19.
 Government has 100 vessels of war on the stocks at the different dockyards, of which fourteen are first rate line of battle-ships.
 It is expected that Parliament will be prorogued at the end of May or the beginning of June.

It is stated in the City that an extraordinary Ambassador is going from this country to Lisbon, to negotiate for the settlement of the differences between Don Miguel and his brother Don Pedro.
 We are glad to hear that a regulation about to be adopted by the Duke of Wellington, which must give general satisfaction. All pensioners and half pay officers residing on the Continent, will be required to return and spend their money in England. A non-compliance with the order will subject them to a penalty of 30 pr. cent on their respective incomes.
 A report is mentioned in the French papers, of the devastation of Cadix by an inundation, but we have reason to hope that it is without foundation.

The wine trade is exceedingly depressed in France, as are most other branches of trade in that country.
 The Catholics in Ireland, to their honour, are carrying themselves with meekness under their changed circumstances. It was proposed that they should illuminate their houses on the Relief-Bill receiving the Royal assent; but at a public meeting in Dublin, held on Tuesday, the proposal was unanimously deprecated. In his speech at this meeting, Mr. Shell said that though he regretted the disfranchisement of the 40,000 freeholders it was a small sacrifice compared with the liberty of which it was the price; and he likened it to the blow on the cheek which a Roman master gave to his slave, when in the very act of imparting to him his freedom.

The accounts from the seat of war in the East are contradictory and indelible. Some of them states that the campaign begun; that various skirmishes have taken place on the fortified points between Varna and the Danube; and that in them as well as in a sanguinary battle fought near Ghiurgezy, the Russians have had the advantage. Other accounts say that Russia preparations are so far from being complete, that it will be the beginning of May before their armies are in the field in force. The principal theatre of the campaign, it is believed, will be the shores of the Black Sea.
 It is stated in a letter from Frankfort, that the Cabinet of Berlin, on being asked by the French government what were its intentions with regard to the war between Russia and Turkey, positively disavowed any intentions of taking part in the war.

Moder by Don Miguel.—It is very confidently stated in letters from Lis-

bon, that Don Miguel has added to his crimes the commission of a murder by his own hand. The day on which the murder was committed, Don Miguel had been informed that his elder sister, Dona Isabela Maria, the late Princess Regent, had, the day before, sent one of her servants, from the Palace with her jewels and State papers. Don Miguel became instantly frantic at the apprehension of a plot. He hastened to his sister's apartment, and demanded to see her jewels and the State papers in her possession, and also what had become of her servant. The Princess, terrified at his manner, was unable to answer. This increased his rage, and he laid violent hands on her. A struggle ensued, in which he fell on the floor, and the Princess flew to the door. The monster at that moment discharged a pistol at her. The ball missed the Princess, but a servant who was hastening to the scene with the Count Caracade, was shot dead by the Royal assassin, who also aimed a blow of a poniard at the Count, by which he was severely wounded. The Princess was immediately shut up in a solitary apartment of the palace, and a guard set over, and her life is considered in the greatest peril. The news of the murder, and the apprehended execution of the Princess, has excited a feeling in the utmost horror in Lisbon.

A terrible earthquake took place in Spain in the early part of April, the details of which are truly shocking.

Four towns have been almost entirely ruined; namely—Guardamar, Torre-vija, Almoradi, and Los Dolores.—The number of deaths is to be incalculable. Four hundred and seventy bodies were dug out of the ruins of Almoradi. Mineral springs have been removed to the distance of six miles from the place where their sources originally were. The river Segura, which flowed through the city of Murcia, has changed its course, and its mouth. Four great craters are opened at Benjuzar. Two other craters opened at the place where Torre-vija was built, pour forth torrents of foetid water. The King of Spain has ordered all the revenues of the province of Murcia to be employed in relieving the persons whom this misfortune has reduced to misery.

Lisbon.—We found it remarked in the London-Sun of the 15th, that there was a strong reason to believe that an expedition is about to be fitted out against that arch usurper Don Miguel, with all speed. His recent conduct has been so barbarous as to leave government no longer any alternative but to interfere, in order to vindicate the laws of nations, as well as to protect the rights of humanity. In taking this step we believe our ministers have the full concurrence of the French government.
