**FROM THE NEW-YORK AMERICAN, APRIL 16.**  
**FRENCH SPOILIATIONS.**—The memorial upon this subject, addressed by the merchants and others of this city, to the President, will be found upon our first page. The French nation, which has profited by the large sums sequestered and applied, in many instances, and to great amounts, without even the form of trial, to the exigencies of the public service, cannot claim, or desire to claim exemption from repayment. The actual government has not, either, ever attempted to set up the plea, that it is not responsible for the acts of that which it superseded; nor, if it did, could such a plea be, for a moment, admitted, among nations. But the present rulers of France have actually paid claims, to the amount of many millions, preferred by European subjects, for wrongs done by the Imperial government; and it is only because we are distant and patient, that American claims still remain unredressed. We are glad, therefore, to see the tone adopted in the memorial, before the injured—conscious of the goodness of its cause, and confiding in the power and disposition of its government to enforce that cause. The memorial, too, is judicious. A new minister is about to proceed to France, a representative from the new administration. Mr. Rives is said to be a gentleman of considerable talents, though lacking, unhappily, as we are informed, what seems to us, one of the main qualifications of a foreign minister, a knowledge of the language of the country and Court where he is to reside. So little of the effective part of diplomacy is done by formal correspondence, or at stated interviews, that the who is without the ability, to command the language, however clever, always mistakes, to seize the passing opportunities of society, and turn them to good account, for the purposes of his mission, is without one of the chief means of accomplishing its objects. Still, much may be done by a judicious and continuing course, and we cannot but hope, that such a tone, explicit, especially, in relation to those claims, will be adopted, in the instructions given to Mr. Rives.

**LONDON, April 21.**  
The contents of the French journals relate chiefly to discussions about the conduct of the ministry, and the probability or improbability of Chateaubriand's accession to the cabinet as minister for foreign affairs. Accounts from the banks of the Danube, dated the 11th inst. state that a grand council of war was convoked at Vienna, where all the generals in chief commanding troops in the provinces were assembled, but the object of the Council was not known. It had probably some reference to the resumption of the war by the Russians.

One of the private letters from Lisbon received yesterday has the following paragraph:—"We understand that orders have been transmitted to Oporto for the execution of 20 persons."  
Lord Bercelot is about to proceed to Lisbon, charged with high diplomatic powers.  
The Bank of Messrs. Finlay, of Dublin, has ceased to exist. The principal partner has withdrawn himself, and this once high and commanding establishment is now no more.  
The duke of Wellington has recently purchased a large estate, late property of Sir Peter Pole, in the neighbourhood of Strathfieldsay, for upwards of 250,000 pounds sterling.

Although his Grace was so unwell on Tuesday week as to render it prudent in his surgeon, Dr. Hume, to bleed him, yet he could not be prevailed on to postpone his visit to Windsor the day after. His pallid complexion and his loss of flesh sufficiently mark the agitation and fatigue his mind has lately undergone. He has left town for Strathfieldsay, and from thence will cross the country, to enjoy the exhilarating society of some friends now in Northamptonshire. *Gore's Liverpool Adc.*

A public meeting has been held at Bristol, the Mayor, J. Cave Esq. in the chair, at which a series of resolutions were passed, expressive of the opinion of the meeting on the advantages of a free trade with the countries to the eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, and petitions to both Houses of Parliament were signed, against the renewal of the exclusive privileges of the East India Company in favour of such trade.  
A letter has been received from the Home Secretary by Colonel Lord Grey, directing the regiment of Cheshire Cavalry to assemble at Liverpool for ins-

pection on the 18th and 19th of June. The kingdom of the Netherlands has refused to adopt the principle of trial by jury. Three questions submitted to the Second Chamber of the States-General upon this important subject were negatived by considerable majorities.

**Extraordinary preservation.**—The Shannon, packet of this port, Timothy Collins, master, put in here on Thursday, from St. Michael's, with a cargo of lemons and oranges. She is a tight-built sloop of about 60 tons burthen only, and was consigned to Liverpool. When lying at anchor at St. Michael's having completed her loading, and the master ashore waiting for his papers, a violent gale sprung up, and drove the craft out to sea. There were but three men and a boy on board, utterly destitute of the slightest knowledge of navigation, and scarcely cognizant of the four cardinal points of the compass. They ran before the wind at the mercy of Providence for several days, and their stock of provisions was just exhausted when a typhoon met a Frenchman steering for the banks of Newfoundland; he kindly offered to take them on board, which they declined; he then gave them a small cask of biscuit and some verbal instructions as to the point they were driving for. On parting company they again set sail and after 35 days' exposure to the elements made the Shannon to the inexpressible joy of the adventurous mariners. For 15 days the crew subsisted almost exclusively on oranges.

**From Steam Boat.**—Mr. Neilson of Glasgow, whose experience and skill in the construction of steam vessels is well known, is now building one of iron. It is some years since a canal boat was made of this metal, but so far as we know it has not been hitherto employed for steamboats, though the advantage of having these of an incombustible material is extremely obvious. Mr. Neilson's iron vessel is of a pretty large size. The length of the keel is 90 feet; the length on deck will be about 100; the breadth at midships 16 feet. She is built on the same principle as a wooden vessel, but the shell is of a plate iron, rivetted together as to boilers. It is expected that she will be a fast-sailer; but it is not determined yet where she is to ply. *Colony Mercury.*

Measures have been taken for establishing a line of steam-packets between this country and the East-Indies. Mr. Washburn, the gentleman under whose management the ship has been matured, is confident that he can perform the voyage out and in in six months, including stoppages both ways to deliver letters, &c. at Madeira, St. Helena, the Cape, Isle of France, Trincomalee, and Madras, at all of which places there will be depots of coals. The use of the packets will be chiefly for the conveyance of dispatches, letters, specie, &c. but in the event of individuals engaged on public and important duty accommodation will be afforded.

An Irish soldier once waited on his commanding officer, with what he termed a very serious complaint. "Another man, he said, upbraided him that he was not married to his own wife, whom he accused of being no better than she should be, and called her many names, besides, which he should be a-bused to mention to his brother." Colonel—Well, my good fellow, have you any proof that you are legally married? Soldier—Rely on your honor, I have the best proof in the world. Here he took off his hat, or rather cap, and exhibited a rat skull, saying, "Dare your honor think I'd be after talking that same abuse from any body but a wife?" *Shipp's Memoirs.*

**WELL-TIMED PEN.**—A gentleman, not very conspicuous as to taking long credit, was telling a marvellous story of having lost his watch in the course of a pedestrian excursion in the Cape. "It was quite dark," said he, "when I mislaid it, the article was valuable, and I knew that an hour previous it was safe in my possession. I at once retraced my steps and after walking nearly three miles on those hilly roads, I actually put my foot upon the watch, which was not at all injured. There is nothing surprising in that," said a wag present, "you were always noted for going upon tick."
