**NEW-YORK, June 4.**  
Latest from England.—By the brig United States, Capt. Knight, from Plymouth, which she left on the 4th of May, we have received London papers to the 29th April, and Plymouth papers to the 2d of May, inclusive.

The British Parliament resumed its sittings on Tuesday, the 28th of April. The Duke of Norfolk, Lords Clifford and Dormer, took their seats as Peers of the realm. The Chancellor of the Exchequer was expected to produce his budget in a few days, but no intimation of its contents had transpired. It is thought that the prorogation will take place early in June. After the disposal of the most important question of domestic policy, it is expected that the remainder of the session will be more than usual interesting, from the disclosures which are looked for respecting the state of the foreign relations of the British empire, and more especially those with Russia and Portugal.

There was a report in London which seems to have obtained some credit, that Lord Beresford was about to proceed to Portugal as Ambassador extraordinary from the British Court, with the view of effecting an adjustment of differences between the royal brothers Don Pedro and Don Miguel. Beresford is unpopular with the party in Portugal which opposes the absolute government of Don Miguel, and this circumstance it is thought may give greater weight to his counsels with the usurper.

Lisbon dates had been received at Falmouth up to the 22d of April. The Portuguese squadron destined for the Western Islands sailed on the 18th from the Tagus, one of the m proved leaky and was obliged to put back. Lisbon was still in an unsettled state—all business at a stand. Lisbon article of the 4th of April says, that Don Miguel appeared before an assembly of magistrates assembled at Juchoz, who sat several hours in deliberation, that he there accused his sister of conspiring against his person and his system of government—and that the magistrates had the weakness to direct proceedings to be commenced against the Princess.

The Plymouth Herald of May 2d states an undoubted fact that Capt. Hanchet late of the British Navy a brave and enterprising seaman left that port the week previous in the Hilton Jolly-steam vessel for the Mediterranean. It is said he will have the command of the Turkish fleet.

**Corn Laws.**—In the House of Commons on the 30th of April, M. Human gave notice that on the 19th of May he should move that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to be into consideration the Act of the 9th George IV. relating to the Corn Laws, & the propriety of imposing a fixed instead of a fluctuating duty. It also moved for various Returns relating to the Silk Trade.

The tax British spirit amounted last year to four millions, on tea, to three millions, and on candles to half a million.  
Keane the actor has had a paralytic attack in the lower extremities and it is said can never again appear on the stage. Madame Malibran has made her appearance at King's Theatre as Rosina in the Barber of Seville.

The Telegraph of the 25th, says—Parliament will re-assemble after the holidays, on Tuesday next, when all the English Catholic Peers are expected to take their seats in the House of Lords. It is generally believed that the prorogation will take place early in June. The most agitating domestic questions having been disposed of, the session will be chiefly interesting from the anticipated disclosures of the state of our foreign affairs. Among them the relations with Russia and with Portugal, are the most important.

London, April 30.—City 12 o'clock.  
The same universal gloom that has lately pervaded every thing in the city, still continues; and the price of produce of every description, seems to be daily more depreciated. This state of affairs appears to have caused some alarm among the merchants and persons of capital; and is becoming still more serious to the general wellere, by the accounts of the state of trade, in the country. From this cause, may be traced the declination, on the part of the speculators, in the funds, to enter into new engagements, till they can see their way more clearly.

April, says—“We have just heard that there are now loading in the Baltic, sixty-seven ships for French ports, which will bring us, before the end of May, about thirty million pounds of grain.”

London, 29th April.—Two o'clock.—The English Funds have been dull and uninteresting all the morning. Consols for Account were heavy at 87 1-2. The quotation is now 87 5 8. In Exchange Bills and Indias, there is little alteration.

**Plymouth, Saturday, May 2.**  
The affairs of Russia and Turkey engross a considerable portion of the attention of the politicians of the day, and the progress of the armies is looked forward to with much anxiety. Russia, it is evident, is influenced by a desire to crush Turkey, in order to extend her power; and we fear, unless the Autocrat be remonstrated within a very forcible manner, he will pursue and obtain his object, to the decided disadvantage of England and other European States.

Russia is already a powerful nation; her population is almost numberless; and let her obtain the fertile provinces of Turkey—her sea-ports and arsenals, and the Emperor Nicholas will dictate laws to Europe.  
It is evidently the policy of England and the other States to prevent this; and, indeed, it is reported that the Government of this country joined by that of France and Austria, will inform Russia that they will not remain silent spectators, and see Turkey become a conquered country. If Russia still perseveres, it is more that a higher tone will be used, and perhaps the torch of war lit in the East, may spread its flame throughout Europe.

**House of Lords—Tue day April 29.**  
Their lordships met at half past 3 o'clock.  
**Reception of the Catholic Peers.**—The opposition side of the House was crowded with ladies, in anticipation of the appearance of the Catholic Peers of England taking their places under the recent act for the removal of the Roman Catholic disabilities.

The Duke of Norfolk, and Lords Clifford and Demer, took their seats in the House of Lords as Peers of the Realm, upon the re opening of Parliament.  
**Latest from Havre.**—The Barque Warren, Captain Snow, of Thomaston, (Me.) arrived this forenoon from Havre, which port she left on the 26th of April, but has brought no papers. Captain Snow states that bread stuffs has taken a rise, but that there was no alteration in the price of cotton since the sailing of the last Havre Packet, the 21st of April.

**Extract of a letter from Havre, dated April 26.**  
“Since ours of the 21st inst. per France there has been a further small improvement in the price of Flour and it would now command 55 francs in bond. It now appears that there is a real scarcity in the north of France and as the new crop will not be fit for consumption before the latter end of August it is probable that prices will be supported if not rise.”

**Philadelphia, June 1.**  
**From Lisbon.**—The brig Juniata, Capt. Lubec, arrived at this port yesterday, in 38 days from Lisbon. She sailed April 18.  
From Captain Lubec, we learn that had been rain at Lisbon, for 70 days in succession, the country deluged, and the crop entirely destroyed—that there was great distress at Lisbon, numerous executions taken place daily. At Oporto 36 were to have been executed, but for the want of a hangman, their executions had not taken place. The Portuguese fleet sailed from Madeira April 22, for Terceira.

**Launch.**—The ship Erie, intended to form one of the packets in the “First and Second Havre Lines,” was launched yesterday afternoon from the shipyard of those enterprising and successful builders Messrs. C. Bergh & Co. The Erie entered the water in beautiful style at about 10 minutes past 5 o'clock amid the cheers of hundreds of spectators, and a salute from a vessel in the neighborhood. The interest of the scene was greatly enhanced by the appearance on the quarter deck of numerous well dressed ladies. It might be deemed invidious to draw a comparison between this splendid ship splendid ship and others that have been recently launched in this city; we will therefore content ourselves by saying that the well earned reputation of the builders is fully supported in the structure of the Erie. We learn that her dimensions are as follows:—Length of keel 113 feet, length on deck 125 feet, breadth of beam 28 feet 6 inches, depth of lower held 11 feet 6 inches, between decks 6 feet 9 inches, and 500 tons burthen. The Erie will be commanded by Capt. J. P. Fock

who is advantageously known as the late commander of the France. She will take her regular station in the line and sail from this port on the 1st of August next.

The France will hereafter be commanded by Captain E. Funck.  
Another line ship is on the stocks in the same yard, intended for the Old Line of Havre packets, and will be launched in about six weeks.—Gazette.

The Macon Telegraph gives an account of a meteoric stone weighing thirty-six pounds, which fell in Monroe county on the 8th of May. Its fall was preceded by a noise heard at the distance of 25 or 30 miles. The sound was compared to that produced by the discharge of a large canon, quickly followed by a smaller one, and then by a great number of muskets.

**The Temporary Loan.**—We learn, says the Pennsylvania Intelligencer, that Stephen Girard has loaned the states \$100,000 for the canal fund. We are also informed that the Mechanics' bank of Philadelphia loaned for the same fund \$20,000—the bank of Pennsylvania \$100,000—and the Philadelphia bank \$50,000.

**From Lima.**—The brig Francis, Captain Wood, has arrived at Baltimore, in 84 days from Lima, with specie. We are indebted to the Baltimore Chronicle for the following:—  
“There was no news of importance. The prohibitory decree, which was to have gone into effect on the 16th of February, still remained a dead letter on the 24th, as will be seen by the following extract of a letter, to a commercial house in Baltimore, dated  
“Lima, February 24, 1829  
“The prohibitory law will go into effect without doubt. There appeared until yesterday, some hope that it would not take place. The opinions of inhabitants have been so various, that I have declined writing until it should be ascertained.  
P. S. I am under the impression that if a vessel was to arrive, she would be permitted to an entry, notwithstanding the prohibition. Such is the exhausted state of the treasury in this country, that an offer of cash in payment of duties would be irresistible.”

**Model of the Inquisition.**—The English papers give an account of a curious model of the Inquisition, formerly situated at Coimbra, in Portugal. It is exhibited in Pall Mall. It was constructed by Mr. Young, a British Officer, lately in confinement for several months as a state prisoner of Don Miguel. The following is a description of it from a London paper.  
When we visited the model, Mr. Young was in attendance, and pointed out the various departments and uses of the building. The model is on the scale of half an inch to a foot, and upon being taken to pieces exhibits the most recesses of the place, from the external roof down to the subterranean dungeons. The instruments of torture and the mode of using them, are also displayed by very ingenious devices. Five varieties of torture were mildly termed by the Holy Office, are exhibited:—The water treatment, whereby the patient whose refractory disposition would not allow him to confess all he knew to the Grand Inquisition, was bound down with cords and obliged to swallow several gallons of water, administered through a funnel till, on the point of suffocation, he was humanely released by being placed heels up-ist, so that the superfluous liquid might run out through his mouth and nose—the fire treatment, whereby an untoward temper was warned of the deference due to the Inquisition, by being fixed on an iron cradle, with the soles of his feet exposed to a brisk fire without the power of withdrawing them a single inch from its scorching influence, a treatment which may be regarded as somewhat an approach to the Mahometan's hell, pictured as a place where men are shod with boots of red iron, making their brains boil like a cauldron. There are three species of the violent treatment by which men were repeatedly hauled up by ropes to the ceiling of a high room, and suddenly let drop, so as frequently to dislocate and break their limbs. By another device a man was tied down to a horse-manger, with his hands fastened behind him, so as to be obliged to eat his food like a pig or an ox. This, however, as Mr. Young explained it, was not deemed a punishment, but only a degradation. The holes through which the Monks were enabled to see what every prisoner was about, the knowledge of which was often used by the Grand Inquisitors to impress their victims with the belief of their possessing supernatural powers—the secret places where the bones of those who were murdered, or reduced to death by the lingering pangs of confinement, were deposited, until the celebration of an *Auto da fe*, when they were burnt; and many other “secrets” of the prison house equally interesting and instructive, will be found fully and in

telligibly displayed in Mr. Young's del.

R. H. Mahon, a Postmaster, Tennessee, sentenced 2 or 3 years six to ten years imprisonment for stealing the contents of a letter, has been pardoned by the President, at the recommendation of the Judge, the prosecuting counsel, the Marshal, and other. The prisoner, according to Nashville Republican, was so ill, that his death seemed inevitable unless released.
