LATE AND IMPORTANT FROM COLOMBIA.—We are indebted to the politeness of the Colombian Consul for Caracas papers to the 6th of June, inclusive. They confirm the important rumor received a few days since by the schooner Chatham from Porto Cabello, that THE WAR BETWEEN COLOMBIA AND PERU WAS LIKELY TO BE RENEWED.

On the 14th of March, the following order was addressed by Col. Jose Prieto, Commandant General of the Department Guayaquil, to Don Juan Jose Arrieto, Military Commander of the Circuit of Babas:—

Although by the preliminaries of peace projected on the 27th of last month on the plain of Jiron, by their Excellencies the President of Peru and the commander-in-chief of the south of Colombia, hostilities have ceased on the part of both governments, I have resolved, under the most weighty considerations, to suspend the execution of the referred Treaty, so far as relates to this Department and the squadron, in accordance with the decision of an extraordinary Council of War convened by my order of the 11th inst., until the final determination of the Supreme Government, in view of the suggestions of the said Council, shall be made known. In consequence of this decision, and because it may be necessary to defend ourselves against the aggressions of the Colombian forces before the final orders of his Excellency shall arrive, I have thought proper to give you the requisite information, that by exciting the enthusiasm of the people—by providing all the means necessary for defence, and by scrupulously observing the directions of the Commandant General—you may use your best exertions to bring this determination to a happy result.

In trust that your firmness in the cause of the people; your energy and other good qualities; will cause you to exercise such activity and vigilance, that I never shall have occasion to reproach you with the least fault. Communicate this note to the authorities of your jurisdiction or dependency, and be assured that the forces which protect this Department, in conjunction with the Gallant Squadron, will sustain the existing order of things at all hazards, unless new instructions are received to the contrary.—May God preserve you. JOSE PRIETO.

Proclamation to the Inhabitants and Garrison of Guayaquil.—Fellow citizens and Soldiers: When the officers of the squadron and the town, being assembled in a Council of War on the 11th of the present month, came to a solemn determination not to evacuate the place until the decision of the Supreme Government should be known, they will know that this determination, dictated by their patriotism, their honor and their right, was conforming to the wishes of the people, promotive of their best interests, and demanded by a sense of national honor. Shall this honor be compromised in presence of the brave defenders of Peru to be sold by the Convention of Jiron, and that of the whole continent to be put at hazard? No, no: they groaned with horror, when by that same enemy the veil was torn asunder which concealed from their view the precipice which opened to the grave of their country, and the hand of posterity about to imprint a foul transmit their brave deeds and illustrious names to future time. Their generous spirits, kindled into the most noble and holy indignation, demand this day from the enemies of their glory, a public and explicit retraction of the degrading impostures [representations of the battle, &c.] with which they have dared to blacken their conduct, and are preparing to wipe away these aspersions by engagements more successful, without doubt, than that of Tarqui, in which the Colombians will have opportunity to display the heroic valor which they claim in this.

Guayaquilenians! Overflowing with joy, animated with delight, I hasten to communicate to you the plausible news that already the tyrants despar of ruling you, of usurping your rights, of satiating themselves with your blood, of enjoying your riches. You are under the protection of the army, and as a guarantee of your security, I offer you the mastery of the Peruvian Republic. You enjoy all its privileges.

Soldiers! You possess the same sentiments which animate your companions of the army; your deaires are one; your intrepidity is the same; the same Peruvian blood flows through your veins: the

same also will be your efforts, your sacrifices and your devotion to the public good,—the only rule by which your ancient companion will regulate his conduct.

Guayaquil, March 22. JOSE PRIETO. Arrival of the French Envoy.—On the 16th of May, M. Bresson announced to the Minister of Foreign Affairs his arrival at the Colombian capital in the quality of Envoy of His Majesty the King of France, and submitted his credentials 'on the 17th. On the 19th he was presented to the council of Ministers, the Ministers of State, the Presidents of the Supreme and Superior Court, the Arch-Bishop Metropolitan, the Prefect, the Commandant General, &c. assembled in the Palacio.

LATE FROM EUROPE. LONDON, May 30.—Letters from Constantinople of May 2, say it is firmly believed that the Russians project a landing on the Asiatic coast of the Black Sea, and that the attack on Sizepoli was only contrived as a mask to this vast enterprise.

LONDON, May 31.—Accounts from the seat of war in the East mention the probability of a desperate attempt being about to be made by the Russians against the heart of the Ottoman Empire. It is said that the Russian Generals are determined to transfer the seat of war to the very gates of Constantinople, by means of a descent in Natolia. It is added that the Porte was making the greatest efforts to disconcert this plan, and, amongst the rest, was straining every nerve to equip a fleet capable of coping with that of the enemy in the Black Sea. We are likewise told that the Russian fleet in the Archipelago is to co-operate in the execution of this project, by making its way through the Dardanelle, as well as the Bosphorus, into the Euxine.

From the Times. On the subject of the extension of the Russian blockade of the Dardanelles, we must repeat what we said yesterday,—that it cannot be tolerated. A blockade of the Dardanelles, it is called! Why, it is a blockade of the whole of the ocean that was known to the ancients—to the Greeks, Romans, Egyptians, and Assyrians. It is impossible that such a blockade can be suffered. It must not: as Englishmen, we assert, it shall not be allowed.

From the London Courier of May 30. The French Papers of Thursday contain intelligence from Jassy to the 9th, and Constantinople to the 3d inst, which shows, on the one hand, that severe conflicts have taken place on the Banks of the Danube, in which the Turks have fought with unparalleled valour and enthusiasm, and it may fairly be inferred with unexpected success; and on the other, that the efforts of the Russians to Blockade the Dardanelles strictly have failed, and that a sufficient number of vessels, of different nations, had arrived to relieve the scarcity felt for a short period in that capital.—In Bulgaria however, the want of corn continued, but chiefly because it had been collected for the use of the army, whose subsistence was secured, however the inhabitants of the province might suffer from the extremities of famine. It was believed at Constantinople that the Russians had experienced repeated defeats in Asia, and that the whole Pachaik had been wrested from their hands. The report of separate negotiations between the two Belligerents is not even mentioned in these advices. Some of the fortified posts occupied by the Russians between Varna and the Danube, and securing their line of communication, are stated to have been carried by the Turks.

Rome, May 9.—Accounts from Corfu, of the 20th April say, that letters from Egina, announce that the Russian Squadron has received orders to attempt the passage of the Dardanelles, at a certain fixed time, and that this attempt was to be combined with a movement of the Russian fleet in the Black Sea, to attack Constantinople with considerable maritime force.—Diario de Romania.

Baton Rouge, July 25.

During the last month we have heard of a great-d depredations committed within this and the neighbouring parishes by runaway negroes; not a day passes without bringing accounts of fresh atrocities. About a week since a runaway negro in such a manner that his life despaired of, the negro was on the same day killed by an inhabitant, refusing to surrender himself alive. Four negroes were shot in one night in the same parish, and several have been killed at the Plains and the High Lands. Within a mile of this town the driver on Madame Rowell's plantation was taken out of the field by a number of runaways and would no doubt have been killed had not the slaves of the plantation rescued him. In fact the shocking occurrences daily related, surpass belief. In our immediate vicinity last Friday, a man was found mangled in a most shocking manner, with life almost extinct, the perpetrators are supposed to

be runaways; information was given immediately to the Mayor, of the state in which the poor disfigured, and almost murdered stranger lay bleeding on the road, to which his "honour" replied "that as the person was out of this Corporation, he could do nothing for him!!!" Application was then made for assistance to the Parish Judge, who we are informed, also declined doing anything!! Happily however for the honour of our parish, a person well known to the community, for his being feelingly alive to the ties of humanity, and whose name we would with pleasure give to the public, were we not fearful of his disapprobation; instantly had the friendless stranger transported to this village, where every care has been taken of him, and hopes are now entertained of his recovery.

We mention these circumstances to awaken the public from the lethargy in which they slumber, and to excite them to use prompt and energetic means for the prevention of such crimes. Our parish from its being the first highland above New-Orleans, is the resort of all those slaves who escape from the planters below; our woods and thickets afford them shelter, and the poor industrious farmer in the interior of our parish who depends on his own hands for a support, is nightly robbed by those villains.

We would earnestly recommend that application be made to the Governor to order out the militia of this section of the State without delay, in order to search the woods and apprehend these marauders. PLURES.

Since writing the foregoing we are informed that the Col. of the 11th Regt. has ordered out the troops under his command, to proceed without delay to scour the woods throughout this parish.
