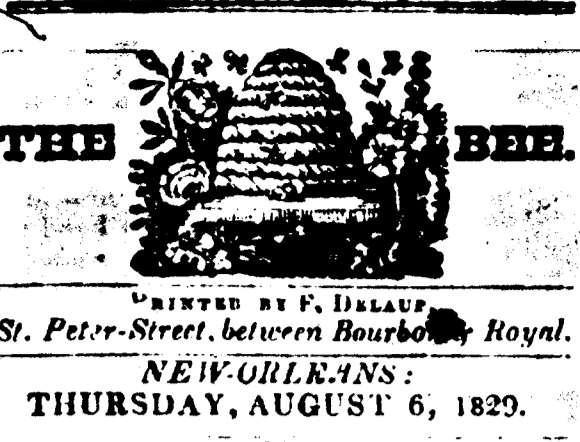

By the ship news received in this day's mail, it appears that on the 8th instant, the President of the United States left Alexandria in the steam boat Potomac, for Norfolk. He was accompanied by the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of War and his lady, the Postmaster General and his lady, Generals Macomb and Bernard, Major Donaldson his lady and Miss Eaton, Commodores Rodgers and Warrington, and several other officers military and naval.

NEW-YORK, July 13.

FROM BUENOS AYRES.—The U. States sloop of war BOSTON, *Beckman V. Hoffman*, Esq. Commander, arrived at this port yesterday from Buenos Ayres, via Montevideo and Pernambuco. She left the former port on the 15th of May, and has had the remarkably short passage of 39 days from Montevideo, including 4 days detention at Pernambuco. We are indebted to an officer on board, for files of Buenos Ayrean papers to the 16th of May, inclusive, from which we are unable to make any extracts for this day's paper, owing to the late hour at which they were received. We have also obtained verbal intelligence from Buenos Ayres to the 30th of May, and other information, the substance of which is subjoined.

At the last dates from Buenos Ayres, the city was in possession of the "Army of the Provinces," except the Grand Plaza de Victoria and the Citadel, and it was expected that they would surrender. Lavalle was in the city, and using every exertion to maintain ascendancy, but there was scarcely a hope of his succeeding. The invading army from the interior (styled the Federal party) was led by Lopez, Governor of the Province of Santa Fe, and their object was to revenge the death of Gov. Dorrego, and re-establish the Federation of the Provinces of La Plata. Lavalle's party, which had caused the revolution, was called Unitarian, and they were in favour of a consolidated government, the head of which should be Buenos Ayres.

Admiral Brown had resigned his situation as Provisional Governor of the Province, and it was reported when the Boston sailed, that he was about fitting out a fleet to proceed against San Nicolas or Santa Fe, but the last accounts received at Montevideo stated the project had been abandoned.

The press at Buenos Ayres was under severe restrictions, which consequently prevented a full and free expression of public opinion as to the situation or politics of the country, the publishers being compelled to confine themselves to accounts and reports in favor of Lavalle's party, which were, of course, greatly exaggerated.

In consequence of alleged insults to the French flag and nation, the Consul-General, M. Mandeville, demanded his passports, which were granted, and he left Buenos Ayres, with his family and effects, on the 6th of May, in the French ship Galatée, for Montevideo; where he arrived on the 8th. The French Admiral on that station had also taken possession of the Buenos Ayrean squadron, consisting of four brigs and several gunboats. The vessels were attacked by the boats of the French squadron, and after being repulsed five times, they succeeded in capturing them, and burned out of the brigs.

At Montevideo all was apparently tranquil when the Boston sailed, but it was said that there was some jarring among the leaders. They were busily engaged in regulating the government, and framing a constitution for that province.

The Boston has been absent from the United States three years and three months, during which time she has only lost three of her original crew, who died of consumption. During her long cruise, she has been a great deal at sea, and we are assured that, although she has fallen in with hundreds of vessels, she has never met any that could outsail her.

Lieut. Calhoun came up to town yesterday afternoon, and will proceed to Washington this morning, with dispatches for government.

RECAPTURE OF MEXICO.—The boasted project of reconquering the republic of Mexico, and once more placing that beautiful country under the paternal protection of the Spanish monarchy, has ever been regarded by all acquainted with the relative affairs of the two nations, as a mere rhodomontad—a speculation as silly as many which were agitated in

Great Britain, even after the peace of 1782, having for their object the reduction of this republic to the happy condition of a British dependency. The king of Spain, and his effeminate ministry have sufficient business upon their hands at home, without taking upon themselves the trouble and perplexity of fitting out a very formidable force for the recovery of former possessions abroad—and sufficient use for all the resources of their European territory, without hazarding the sacrifice of some millions of dollars, which too, they must first borrow.

On this subject we find the subjoined very rational remarks in the *New-York Daily Advertiser* of Tuesday. The facts therein stated, are without question worthy of confidence—and the deductions are not only plausible, but inevitable.

The Expedition against Mexico.—We have information on which we can rely, in relation to certain circumstances connected with this Quixotic enterprise, which are of some interest to the public, and important to be known in Mexico. Such is the state of things, that we are well confirmed, not only in the opinions we have expressed of the necessary failure of the enterprise, but of the insincerity and dishonesty which have dictated it.

Barradas, who is placed at the head of the expedition, has not wisdom enough to make the declaration attributed to him in a paragraph we copied from a southern paper yesterday. He undoubtedly think she may reconquer one of the old colonies; but the governor, officers, and inhabitants of Cuba are unanimously opposed to it, and regard it as a wanton and useless exposure of human life. Even the Spanish Ministry, far from sanctioning the undertaking, resolutely opposed it, and could not be prevailed on to give their consent: so that the order was finally communicated, not from the proper department, nor through the customary channels, but by the king himself directly to the commander. This was done in so peremptory a manner, that no remonstrance or opposition could be made: and of course the plan is to be pursued.

With regard to the king, it is incredible that he could really anticipate any important results from sending so contemptible a force to the Mexican coast, and under the command of an ignorant boatman, as Barradas, without talents, merit, military education, or experience. His Majesty, it is to be presumed, expected, by this show of invasion, to satisfy those who were clamorous for it, and probably hoped some of the expelled Spaniards would trust part of their treasure in his hands. Judging, however, from what we hear of the unanimous opinion in Cuba, we believe he will be disappointed in both these respects. The force is far too small to encourage disaffected individuals in Mexico to risk their interests on its success, as it will plainly be unable to defend itself, much more to protect them. At the same time those who have wished to see the reconquest undertaken in earnest, are disgusted at the feeble attempt. We now learn that the report of a reinforcement from Spain does not obtain the least credit even at Havana.

Extract of a letter to a gentleman in Philadelphia, dated St. Jago de Cuba, June 20, 1829: "We have not a barrel of American flour in the market on sale. We purchased a cargo a few days since agreeably to order, for a house in Kingston, Jamaica, at \$9 50, short price. Our dates thence are up to the 26th ult. Flour, 13 50 to \$14, and not over two weeks supply."

It is seriously stated, we know not on what grounds, that Mr. McLane, our new Minister to England, has been instructed to negotiate with the British Ministry, with reference to the Tariff of 1828—That is, he is authorized to say, that the rate of duties will be essentially modified if Great Britain will admit, on moderate duties, the grain and flour of the United States.—*U. S. Gaz.*

An important reform is to be made in the mail arrangements between Paris and London. The mail and the packet boats are now 40 hours in performing the distance which separates the two capitals, and which might be performed in 36 hours by extraordinary couriers. These, so frequently resorted to by merchants, who thereby procure intelligence 20 hours sooner than the post letters, are about to be adopted by the government of France.—The expense is to be supplied by an extra charge of 3 decimes on every single letter, in proportion on the weight of other letters. This charge shall be optional, as the public will remain at liberty to avail themselves of the ordinary mode of conveyance.

To the Editor of the Baton-Rouge Gaz.
M. Editor—I heard without the least surprise, that the expedition which left this place last week for the purpose of taking runaway negroes supposed to be in our neighbourhood, had been ineffectual. Expeditions of this kind should be

conducted without noise and kept as secret as possible; here, it was quite the reverse; in every quarter the din of arms, the beat of the drum, the flourish of the trumpet and the neighing of the couriers resounded, and it seemed as if a formidable invasion was apprehended.

On the evening of the day of departure, several parties of citizens of this town who had been sent into the woods without guides, returned overcome with fatigue, wet up to the waist, having been under the necessity of crossing low grounds covered with water and scarcely possible even for those who make it their business to haunt the woods. At the fall of night the discharge of several muskets was heard, the cause of which I am ignorant, as persons who were present assured me that they could not see any thing to authorize those discharges. I only know, that about 5 o'clock in the evening a ball struck one a door of Mr. Cuppe's house and whizzed in the ears of a person sitting near the door. This, Mr. Editor, is all the information I have been enabled to collect on the subject, and which I transmit to you, with full authority to publish if you think proper.

A young lady walking lately alone, a few miles from Sterling, espied a beautiful male pheasant perched on a stone wall by the roadside. Instead of showing timidity at her approach, he leaped down, and with spurs and beak began a furious attack on the unprotected fair one. Being closely pursued, and seeing no way of escape from the enraged bird, she adopted the only alternative that was left, namely, the seizing her adversary, which she did in the most gentle manner, carried him home, and after gratifying the family and a few friends with a sight of the glossy beauties of the captive stranger, the door was opened, and out he went with a deliberate step, padding backwards and forwards in front of the house, and seemed as if he would associate with the less gaudy but no less useful feathered bipeds of the barnyard. It may be hinted that the lady when attacked, wore a scarlet mantle, which color, every one knows, is very offensive to the turkey, and may be no less to the cock pheasant. But the philosophy of this is left to those who are conversant with the doctrines of ornithology.—*Sterling Jour.*

Imperial Reward.—While the late Minister Yingho has been sentenced to death, forbidden, and banished; the Imperial commissioner in Turkistan, Nayan-chen, has been raised to the highest honors of a titular kind; has received double-eared peacock's feathers; black foxskin jackets; purple bridles; purses, rings, &c. All these are conferred for his alleged good management since the apprehension of Changkibur's rebellion.

Horrid Cruelty and Murder.—On the 4th of last moon, says the Register of Feb. 19, the house of a person named Chun, in the old city, was robbed by banditti, who also gagged and violated successively the two daughters, both under twenty years of age. The Pwanyu Magistrate has required the police to find the culprits within a given period.

Two persons, an old man and a youth belonging to the village Teeckaou, engaged in Canton a small boat to take them home. The boat contained only two persons, an old man and his wife. The youth had on his wrist a gold bracelet, and 300 taels of silver about his person. On the passage the old woman made tea, and offered it to the passengers. Only the youth drank of it. He became drowsy, and placing the silver under his head for safety, went to sleep. They arrived at the village landing place, and the youth was still fast asleep. The old man wished to rouse him, but the boat people persuaded him to go alone, and they would send the young man after he awoke.

The elder passenger left the boat but as he went homewards could not get rid of the suspicion that something was wrong. He therefore hurried back to the landing place, but the boat had put off. He hailed them to return, but the boat held on. He procured another boat to pursue, and at a distance saw the youth slipped overboard. In the pursuit they approached a guard-house where patrols are generally stationed; information was given, and a fast Government boat went in pursuit, and overtook the old people who were running away. The gold bracelet and silver was found, but the youth was lost. Yesterday the old boatman suffered death, by decapitation, immediately on conviction. The woman is not to suffer till after the great autumnal asize.
