**New-York, July 29.**  
**Yellow Fever.**—We understand, say the Morning Herald, that a number of cases of yellow fever have occurred on board a vessel now at the Quarantine from New Orleans, and that some persons died during the voyage.

**New-York, July 30.**  
The body of a man, entirely naked and much mutilated, was cast on shore, at Stamford, Connecticut, on Sunday morning last. It was surmised by some of the inhabitants that it was that of one of the unfortunate sufferers by the explosion of the steam frigate; while others were of opinion that the deceased had been murdered. This last conjecture was in some measure corroborated by several deep gashes on the side of the body. Both arms, and one of the legs entirely and the other to the knee, were gone. The remains were decently interred.

The Pittsburg Statesman says, the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal is in rapid progress. It is under the superintendence of competent and active engineers. The surveys just completed by Judge Roberts appear to have been very satisfactory and he entertains no doubt, it is said, of the practicability of an entire water communication from Washington City to Pittsburg.

**New-York, July 30.**  
From England.—By the ship Thomas Dickson, Capt. Anthony, arrived this day from Liverpool, we have received London and Liverpool papers to the 18th of June. Letters from Odessa, of the 24th of May, state that part of the Turkish fleet had again got out of the Bosphorus and were pursued by Admiral Greigh, lying before Sizopolis.

An article from the Vistula, dated May 28th, says, the Emperor of Russia returned to St. Petersburg on the beginning of July. There was a report that the exportation of corn from the kingdom of Prussia, both by sea and land, would be prohibited until the produce of the approaching harvest could be ascertained. This step was taken on account of the late inundations. The Russian State Gazette has a story of a plot to murder the King of Naples, which had been discovered and prevented.

On the third of June seven Spaniards were arrested by the French with arms near the commune of La Roque, which borders on Spain. They were armed with guns and pistols, and among them was Gen. Milans, who it was supposed was at Montpellier. The Paris Constitutionnel says, that this Milans was a creature of the Count D'Espagne, Governor of Catalonia, and that he with the men under him here, tried to get up a mock insurrection on the frontiers of Catalonia, in order to induce the Spanish constitutionalists in the south of France, to cross the Spanish line and join their suppressed friends, when they might be delivered up to Count D'Espagne.

A Paris paper of June 15th, says, "We have no important news from the theatre of war, the Sultan has gone to his camp; the army of the Grand Vizir is concentrating behind Shumla, while the Russian army is preparing for decisive measures on the left bank of the Danube. Till Silistria has fallen into the hands of the Russians, we must not expect any great military movements." It should seem from this that the story of the abandonment of the siege of Silistria has not been confirmed.

Paris dates of June 11th say, that the Turkish fleet which had come into the Black Sea, hastened to return to the Bosphorus, on learning that the Russian squadron had sailed to meet it. After this retreat, the commander of the Russian fleet, sailing along the coast of Notofia, captured and destroyed 14 Turkish Transports. Capt. Skalowsky went as far as the dock yard of Penderacle, and after a warm engagement, succeeded in burning in the port a new ship of 60 guns, just ready to sail. Admiral Greig returned to Sizopolis.

Mercantile letters from Constantinople say, that the French General Hullot, who lately arrived there with the intention of entering the Turkish service, has been appointed by the Sultan Chief of the general staff. The Turks consider this acquisition as highly valuable, as the General is represented to them as a very distinguished officer, and has promised by his connections in France to engage many other officers to serve the Porte.

It is mentioned in the extracts from Brussels and German papers, that all accounts agree in stating that the Turkish infantry have much improved in discipline during the winter. The Porte commissioned the Pacha of Smyrna to buy several steam-boats, through the agency of English houses. The Sultan is said to have given positive orders to free the European coast of the Black Sea from the enemy, whatever it may cost. The 10,000 Albanians, lately arrived from Thessaly, were ordered towards Sizopolis.

A paragraph, dated Frontiers of Wallachia, May 7, states that the Turks had made an unsuccessful attempt to penetrate into Little Wallachia; they were beaten back by the Cossacks and Pandours.

According to the Hamburg Reporter, letters from Bucharest represent the city in a state of the utmost dependency, and state that all who have the means of doing it are preparing to leave the abode of pestilence and misery, and to seek refuge in Transylvania. At Kalafat according to the same letters, the Turks had been repulsed in an attempt to enter Little Wallachia, but in the vicinity of Varna they had succeeded in cutting off two Russian cavalry regiments.

There is a London paper of the 18th in town, which states that the Russians have extended their blockade to the whole Turkish coast, including Smyrna.

An article from Rome of the 30th May says, that daily earthquakes fill the inhabitants of Monte Albano with consternation, and an eruption of the Monte Cavo was apprehended. The water in the two lakes fell 15 feet, and the trees began to wither and smoke in various places.

Mr. O'Connell was making rapid progress through the country of Clara, in Ireland, on his electioneering tour. The streets from town to town, as he passed along, are said to be literally lined by the population. The people are described as in a state of the most extraordinary excitement. Sir Vessey Fitzgerald is his opponent. The Dublin Evening Post says, that there is an ascertained majority in favor of O'Connell.

There does not appear to be any description, in the manufacturing districts throughout Great Britain.

Great fears are entertained from the continued heat and dryness of the summer, of short crop of potatoes in Ireland. Large shipments have been made to Liverpool and other places, and there have been riots, in the vain hope of preventing exports of the article.

**Fourth Bulletin of the Russian Army.**  
Camp before Sinistria, May 29.

The operations of the siege have already begun, and in the night of the 26th the first parallel was completed. In general the enemy gives us very little interruption in our work. In the night of the 27th, however, he attempted a sally in pretty considerable force, which was chiefly directed against our left wing, but he was repulsed with loss.

General Roth is engaged in completing the union of his corps before Koslandji. The Grand Vizier remains in his camp at Shumla, and has only an advanced guard at Sinistria.—*Frisian State Gazette*, June 9.

[From the Times of June 15]  
Reports are current, that the Court of St. Petersburg has agreed to abandon its whole system of blockade along the Turkish coast, with the exception of the Gulf of Saros. Whether the account be well authenticated we cannot say; but when it is considered how much vexation to commerce generally has been produced by this policy so new on the part of Russia, and at the same time how little has been accomplished by it, of the purpose for which it was professedly designed,—viz. the reduction of the Turkish capital by famine,—it is easy to understand both why England should have made such forcible remonstrances to Russia on the subject, and why the latter should have sought to gain credit for yielding gracefully a point which she would have profited in so trifling a degree, if at all, by continuing to insist upon. We do not apprehend that the tone of Russia had been much heightened by the recent occurrences within the Bulgarian frontier.

[From the Journal du Commerce of Saturday]  
PARIS, JUNE 12.—The Journal of Perpignan publishes the following note respecting the arrest of Gen. Milans:—Some Spaniards were surprised and arrested on the 3d. inst. in a barn situated at the foot of a mountain of the Albres, near the commune of La Roque, which borders on Spain. They were seven in number, armed with guns and pistols. Among them was Gen. Milans, who, there was reason to suppose, was at Montpellier.

The insurrection spoken of in this note, on the Spanish territory, had rather a serious appearance. It is said that the inhabitants of Massant, Agullana, Darius, St. Laurent de la Monga, &c. had taken up arms, and that the stone of the constitution had been set up at Manrea; but, on the other hand, the Count D'Espagne was on the frontier with a force sufficiently considerable to excite fears that this attempt might have fatal consequences for those who may have been engaged in it.

The ship Thomas Dickinson, sailed June 19th, in company with the packet ship N. York, Capt. Bennet. The sales of Cotton for the week amounted to 12,000 bags, at former prices—the imports of the week 28,500 bags.

Extract of a letter from Commodore Porter to his friend in Chester Pa. dated Mexico, May 29th.  
"I have not yet had an interview with the President, but shall settle all

matters with them and return home. On my way here I had a most unpleasant and extremely dangerous adventure; but my good genius protected me, as it has done on many other occasions. Travelling with a friend, and having no apprehension of danger, we were suddenly attacked by three banditti, being part of a gang of seven, well mounted and well armed, with their faces blacked, and looking more like devils than human beings. We had merely time to form a line on one side of the road, while they formed on the other. The battle commenced by their captain discharging his pistol at me at the distance of a few paces; I then fired and should have killed him, had not his horse thrown up his head and received the ball in his neck. He in great rage fired again at me and missed me. By this time all the pistols of the banditti were discharged, as well as those of my friend; one of my pistols was loaded, and I charged with my friend in among them. They fled and we pursued, when the captain suddenly wheeled his horse, passed my friend, and came directly at me with his sabre to cut me down; I waited quietly until he came within six feet of me, when I shot him through the body; he fell on the neck of his horse, and they both came to the ground together.—His companions, seeing this, became intimidated; but after a little, seeing an intention on their part to charge against me, (my friend being occupied in finishing the capt. who was not quite dead.) I seized a small fowling piece which was in the hands of my servant and complied them to retreat; this left us masters of the field. We took possession of the captain's horse &c., and delivered them to the alcalde or magistrate of the next village. The villagers turned out armed and gave pursuit, when soon meeting five of the gang, they killed one of them. It is a most fortunate circumstance for us that we did not fall in with the whole gang; if we had I should not now be alive to tell the tale. My friend (Dr. Boardman,) received a severe sabre wound in his left arm."

**More Gold.**—The Salisbury Journal states that Maj. Jonathan Harris of Mecklenburg county, has discovered a gold mine on his plantation, which promises to be very valuable. He has worked it for several weeks, with only four hands, and has obtained on an average, about pouncing the gravel. The gold is found on the surface from 5 to 6 inches in depth.

**Case of T. Watkins.**—The opinion of the Court was yesterday delivered by chief judge Cranch, on the motion for a venire facias de novo on the indictment against T. Watkins in the 750 dollars case. The motion was granted—the verdict set aside—and a new trial ordered. The Judge stated that the Court would decide to-day whether the old venire should be discharged and a new one summoned for the trial of the case.
