Florida.—This interesting and most valuable region is still developing its own resources and is proceeding in a rapid course of improvement. Six years have scarcely passed since the whole country around Escambia river in the west of the "John's" in the east, a distance of about one hundred miles, was a barren wilderness, inhabited by roving tribes of savages. Four years ago, the first legislative council assembled at Pensacola, surrounded by Indians, since when such has been the tide of emigration, that it is thought the census of 1830 will entitle the territory to admission among the states. The salubrity of the climate, the fertility of the soil, and the valuable character of its products, are obvious and sufficient causes of this rapid progress. The culture of the sugar cane is extending far and wide, and in a few years this most important article of consumption will become the staple of the territory.

The additional intelligence from the seat of war is unimportant, the principal details being the Turkish account of the operations before Schmala Aug 26, which was received some days back by the Wizard at this port from Smyrna. The latest intelligence from the sea of war is contained in the Turkish Bulletin under date of September 2, and the Russian accounts from St. Maura to Sept. 10, which were received by previous arrival.

The Turkish accounts of the operations in Asia received by the arrival is very different from the Russian. It is evident, that a stronger resistance has been made, even in that quarter, by the Turks, than was supposed. This news is not however to a later date than before received. It is very evident from the whole appearance of the most recent news from the seat of war, that the Russians have failed in their avowed objects and that the advantage of the campaign, if advantage there be, is on the side of the Turks.

England.—It is stated, that the Quarter's Revenue, made up on the 10th Oct. 1828, was nearly the same as that of the corresponding quarter of the previous year. A very considerable deficit was apprehended.

The panic which existed Oct. 9th amongst the speculators and jobbers in Consols, had in a considerable degree subsided Oct. 10th.

The Public Ledger of Oct. 11th says—Our city correspondent concludes his article in our paper of to-day with these words: "In Markland expected large arrival of Grain has, for the present obstructed the advance in Wheat."

We most heartily congratulate the public that the advances of the "enemy in grain"—we say enemy, because the name is softer than the usual appellation, are obstructed.

Ireland.—The Irish papers, since the proclamation has been issued by the government for putting down illegal meetings, give a more tranquil account of the state of Ireland.

A meeting of Irishmen and their descendants friendly to the cause of civil and religious liberty in Ireland, was held at Norfolk, Va. on the 27th ult. Walter Herren, Esq. in the chair. 100/- sterling was raised by those present, and a bill for that amount remitted to the Hon. Daniel O'Connell, by the ship "Tally-Ho," which sailed from Norfolk on the 8th inst.—Boston Gaz.

A beautiful ship of 470 tons called the Madison, and intended for the Liverpool trade, was launched at Norfolk; she is owned by Mr. Steinback of Petersburg, Capt. Drummond of Hampton, and Capt. James Cornick, of Norfolk, who is to command her.

boldly challenged her paramour to fight,

and fired two pistols at his victim; after

which he attempted, but without effect,

to destroy himself. On his trial he

maintained great composure, and ex-

pressed his satisfaction at what he had

done—his father's memory and his own

disgrace being avenged in the blood of

the offender. His counsel, in the course

of the defence, stated that the youth

had acted under the influence of a

dream, in which his father appeared to

him, and commanded him to do justice

to his memory upon the man who had

fixed a stain upon it.—London paper.
