On the contrary, if reliance could be placed on their accounts, the war would appear to have commenced with all its horrors, and the Turks to have been defeated with immense loss, both in men and materials. It is however much remarked, that while the Russians publish to the world accounts of their success, they do not allude to the loss they themselves have sustained.

It may be useful at the present moment, to take a hasty retrospect of the operations preceding the late battle, to form some conclusion as to what may be the future results.

Early in May, the Russian armice strenghthened and organized during the winter, made an incursion into Bulgaria, crossing the Danube without oppoition. The main body, under Count Diebitsch, invested the strong fortress of Silistria, but not until there had been some sharp fighting under the walls, and the Turks had succeeded in throwing in a convoy. On the 17th and 18th May, two protracted and bloody engagements took place at Eski Arnaut, a little west of Varna, and between that place and Privadi. The Türks were commanded by Redschid Pacha, the Russians by Gen. Roth. The latter claimed the victory, but was subsequently compelled to make a retrograde movement, and the Turks surrounded Prevadi.
