COLLEGE OF SPRING-HILL.
Under the direction of the Rt. Rev. Dr. POR-
TIER, BISHOP OF MOBILE.

The Institution which will be opened be-
tween the 1st and the 15th of November, inst.
under the appellation of the **College of Spring-
Hill**, is situated on the great mail route from
Washington City to New-Orleans, and seven
miles West of the City of Mobile. Its elevated
situation, overlooking the surrounding country
and commanding a distant view of the Bay of
Mobile—the happy choice which has been made
for its location—the numerous Springs and
during the year which he consecrated to the in-
struction of their youth, are a sufficient guaran-
tee of all that relates to the moral and religious
basis of a good education.

Two Professors of the English language, two
of the French, two of the Latin and one of the
Spanish, a Professor of Mathematics and a Di-
rector General of Studies, constitute the Fac-
ulty or Council of the College under the Direc-
tion of the founder, Doct. Portier, or the Presi-
dent, his Vice General, to whom is also assigned
the duties of the Greek professorship.

To announce to the public that all these are
already assembled at the College, or will be, be-
fore the close of the present month, is to assure
parents and guardians that no pains have been
been, nor will be, spared in the scientific depart-
ment, necessary to insure an education both
solid and useful.

It is needless to mention that Geography, As-
tronomy, History, Rhetoric, Belles Lettres, the
Elements of Physics and Chemistry, &c. &c.
are included in the course of studies.

The **College of Spring Hill** is designed to be
essentially classic. All the students, without ex-
ception, will pursue according to their age, pro-
gress, and the direction of the Council of Pro-
fessors, in connection with other branches, the
study of the Ancient and Modern Languages.

The English, however, will be exclusively the
language of communication.

Through the Regency of the College be Catho-
lic, yet no influence will be exercised upon pu-
pils bred in the principles of other Christian de-
nominations. Good order, however, will require
them to attend the public exercises of morning
and evening prayers, and the Divine service of
the Sabbath. A rigid moral police will be ex-
ercised over all.

CONDITIONS:
1st. The price for the Scholastic year is fixed
at Two hundred and Sixty Dollars—being less
payable semi-annually in advance. The equi-
valent for this sum includes the board of the pu-
pil, their washing, mending, lodging, tuition,
books stationary and whatever else appertains to
their studies.

2d. No pupil can leave the College except at
the end of each semi-annual term, and in all
cases, (sickness excepted,) payment for a term
once commenced will invariably be required—
and

Parents who do not reside in Mobile or New
Orleans, will be required to appoint in one or the
other of these cities a correspondent, and every
correspondent will be held responsible for all
dues.

No pupil will be admitted whose age exceeds
12 years. This regulation admits of no excep-
tion.
