On the existence of Animalculate in Snow. The following account was sent by Dr. J. E. More in a letter to Dr. Silliman. "When the winter had made a considerable progress without much frost, there happened a heavy fall of snow Apprehending that I might not have an oppor tunity of filling my ho se with ice, I threw in mow, perhaps enough to half fill it. There was

iterwards severely cold weather, and I filled the r in ... ler with ice. About August the waste na consumption of the lice brought us down to er show, when it was discovered that a glass of water, which was cooled with it, contained hun ands of animal cutes. I then examined another lass of water out of the same pitcher. & with the aid of a microscope, before the snow was put into it, found it peractly clear and pure: the snow was then thrown into it, and on solution the water exhibited the same phenomenenundreds of animalcules visible to the naked eye with acute attention, and when viewed through h micriscope, resembling most diminutive brimps, and wholly unlike the cels discovered a the accteous acid, were seen in the futi colloy-

ment of animated hature. I caused several holes to be dug in several arts of the mass of snow in the ice-house, and to the centre of it, and in the most uncourses! and repeated experiments had similar results; so hat my family did not again venture to introduce the snow ice into the water they drank, waich had been a favorite method, but used in as an external refringeant for the pitcher.

These little animals may class with the amphibia which have cold blood, and are generally apable, in a low temperature, of a torpid state of existence.
