

THE ARGUS vs. THE ARGUS. French version. "We have received," says the French side of the Argus, "by ship Union, sailed from Havre on the 26th of April, our Paris papers up to the 21st inclusive, and we have been unable, notwithstanding our efforts, to procure later dates from that capital—we doubt that any have been received in this city."

Our readers will perceive by comparing the collateral articles, which we quote above, that the French side of the paper questions the existence of Paris dates posterior to the 21st of April; whilst the English columns positively assert that the Union and Howard brought Havre dates of the 26th and 25th. We would not have noticed the inconsistency, had we not been involved in the contradiction. In neither instance have we been as fortunate as the Argus; we have neither received Paris papers of the 21st, nor Havre dates of the 26th. Our Havre Journals are of the 23rd and contain Paris dates, by express; of the 22d, 5 o'clock, P. M. From these we made hasty translations and issued an extra on Tuesday last. The remarks of the Argus which appeared yesterday, after the publication of our extra, would go to invalidate its contents, since they contained Paris dates of the 22d, while the Argus doubted next day the reception of later dates than the 21st. One of the two things; the dates are either genuine or spurious; if correct, the doubts of the Argus are neither wholesome nor reasonable; if supposititious, we claim no small share of ingenuity for presaging a series of events, posterior to the 21st, and subsequently confirmed by the London intelligence.

REWARDS.—Tyrants are fruitful of expedients to lure, and keep in their power, the soulless things of high and low degree, "gentles, churls, and all," who slavishly kiss the chains, which clang forth the story of their shame and debasement.

We were not a little amused, while perusing our late French papers, by a fulsome description of the many acts of kindness lately perpetrated by Don Miguel. In one instance he spontaneously stood sponsor, at the baptismal font of the church of St. Michael, for the child of one of his officers; in another the dove-mild majesty of Portugal so far condescended as to lip the coarse food of some of the soldiery, whilst showers of confectionaries were rained on the heads of a piteous populace, by order of his lady-queen. And then the rabblement did hoot, and, in the blessed name of *Nuestra Señora da Tujo*, called down the benison of heaven on their right royal persons.—The editor of the *Lisbon Gazette*, the recorder of those who, in Portugal, howl against freedom, as dogs howl against the bright moon, lost in the contemplation of the virtues of his incomparable master, was wrapt into an ecstasy of admiration, and the next day the good people of the capital were reminded, in a sweetly-mouthed manner, of the amenity, condescension, and loving-kindness of their immaculate sovereign.

"The wars of Italy are over," says the messenger in Twelfth Night; and the chapter of rewards must be taken into consideration. The little Duke of Modena, a *duodecimo* copy of Don Miguel, has also hit upon a plan, though a different one, of rewarding his satellites. A scholar, and "a good and a ripe one," he grasped at the science of numismatics, as a finer means of remunerating the upholders of Italian bondage.—A silver medal has been struck, by his orders, bearing this legend: *Fideli militi, anno MDCCCXXXI*. To the most faithful soldier: 1831. On the reverse of the medal is inscribed this glorious motto: *Franciscus IV. dux Mutinæ—Francis IV. Duke of Modena*. These playthings, fit only for overgrown children—mere gewgaws, made to hang on the bosom of degraded wretches, but which cannot conceal the footprint of slavery, stamped on their prostrate necks, were strung up on white and blue ribbons, and distributed among nobles, officers, and soldiers, by the ducal hand, as a reward of their loyalty and zeal in crushing the first-born of Ausonian freedom. Verily, the labourers are worthy of their hire.

WASHINGTON, May 26. The Globe of yesterday contains the following: APPOINTMENTS BY THE PRESIDENT.

EDWARD LIVINGSTON, of the State of Louisiana, Secretary of State, in the place of Martin Van Buren, resigned.
LIVI WOODBRY of the State of New Hampshire; Secretary of the Navy, in the place of John Branch, resigned.
The office of the Secretary of the Treasury, which has become vacant by the resignation of SAMUEL D. INGHAM, has been offered to LOUIS M'LENS, of the State of Delaware, at present Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the U. States to Great Britain. Messrs Livingston and Woodbury have entered upon the duties of their respective Departments. Mr Ingham, we understand, will remain in the Treasury Department, until some unfinished business which he is engaged in, is completed. MARTIN L. WARREN, of Tennessee, who, on the 9th ult. was offered the appointment of Secretary of War, in the place of JOHN H. EATON, resigned, has declined accepting it. We understand that the vacancy in that Department will be forthwith supplied; and that in the meantime its duties will be performed by Mr Eaton.—*Nat. Jour.*

BALTIMORE, May 26. We learn from Washington, that Judge White has finally declined the appointment of Secretary of War, tendered him by the President. His letter is said to be beautifully and touchingly written. The reasons assigned are those which were expected.—the pressure of severe domestic afflictions.

Indeed few men have been tried with heavier calamities in the tenderest relations than Judge White. Of nine children, two only survive, a son and daughter. Since the termination of the last session of Congress, his wife is also deceased, and on her arrival home, he found his remaining daughter in a most precarious state of health. He was more than man, could he under such circumstances have spirits to assume to arduous a public station.
Who will be his successor is not yet mentioned, with any degree of probability;—but the rumor that Major Eaton will resume his duties, is considered without the vestige of probability.—*Republican.*

CLAIMS ON FRANCE.—The following paragraph, conveying information of vast importance to our mercantile lenders, we find in the *London Enquirer* of Friday last. We present it, as derived from private letters from our Minister to France, Mr. Rivis, if from sources at the Seat of Government, it would, we should suppose, have been promulgated in the official paper.—(*Charleston Gazette.*)
Negotiations with France.—It is said that the French commissioners assert the conformity of the Berlin and Milan Decrees with the Laws of Nations; and report favorably on the other cases, amounting only to two or three millions.

We should deeply regret such a result on every account. It would be an act of gross injustice to our plundered merchants;—and from whose hand does the blow come? Not from the Bourbons, but from the regenerated Government of France. In all their negotiations with Mr. Gallatin in Paris, the Bourbons never denied, that the Claims were fairly due. They never justified the Decrees of Bonaparte. As well as we recollect, they never disavowed any responsibility for his act; but they principally relied on their poverty;—to be supported, on the principles of justice and good faith, we are to be put off with a frivolous pretence, that some of the grossest outrages which were ever perpetrated against a neutral Nation, are consistent with the Laws of Nations. The character of France—the free and just principles on which alone her Government can be supported—the deep sympathy which we have felt in her recent struggles—the attachment of our countrymen, and the justice of their Claims, should have inspired her commissioners with a juster spirit. We hope it is not too late to require their errors, and her government will lose no time in reviewing their decision, and in doing justice to our citizens.

IRELAND. The State of Ireland, particularly in the western and southwestern districts, is deplorable. The peasantry, driven to desperation by famine, and the neglect and harassing oppression of the landlords, have resorted to acts of the utmost ferocity. Agricultural property while it is yet in the earth, is devastated and turned to waste; barns are burned, cattle hanged, and houses demolished. Every species of midnight violence is carried into fearful execution, not from motives of religious animosity or political rancour, but because the people want food, because thousands of human beings, driven out from their wretched huts, and pursued by the fangs of their numberless debtors, are driven into the ditches and ditches of the people. The Irish members are remarkable for talking about the miseries of this country, and equally remarkable for leaving them without a remedy. A modified system of poor laws has been warmly opposed by many of the Irish representatives, Mr. Spring Rice included; but nobody has as yet substituted any other remedial application in its stead. The Marquis d'Allesby has done much to soften the moral rigour of circumstances, but it is not in his power to alleviate the physical sufferings of the poor. We again repeat, what we have frequently urged before, that until a law be adopted (file outline and provisions of which we have already laid before our readers, and may probably establish) that shall oblige the Irish landlord to support the poor he makes, or provide adequate employment for them, there will neither be security for life or property, nor respect for the constituted authorities in that country.

POLAND. The *Koningsborg Journal* contains the following: "Letters from Memel give further accounts of the insurrection of Samogitia, and of the taking of Polangen. On the 21 of April the insurgents, although very imperfectly armed, would have taken possession of the small garrison of Poln. Gen. not a detachment of cavalry from Libau, 50 strong, defeated the undertaking; 400 of the insurgents were killed in the encounter; the others retreated to Wilno-schlan. The village was fired during the combat, and many persons, aged and young, were killed and generally, confined to small huts. Twenty houses were consumed at Polangen. The insurgents, subsequently, destroyed the bridge of Libau in order to check the march of the Russian troops; then collecting a more powerful force renewed the attack against Polangen, and it is given as positive news, that during the night of the 5th of April, they took possession of Polangen;—that the garrison evacuated the town, and withdrew to Memel, in order to pass over to Libau, by sea."

Russian Head-Quarters. The weather is so far dry and settled, that the roads will, in a few days, allow our troops to resume their operations. We have concentrated here the corps of grenadiers, the Lithuanian guards, the first corps of the army, and the 3d of cavalry. Some days hence we will take up the offensive. No one would ever suppose that the troops have been exposed to the inclemency of winter, or the fatigue of difficult marches. A train of pioneers are passing at the moment this is being written. From the late accounts Dierwicki was still hemmed in about the vicinity of Zamose.—*Gazette de Prusse.*

GERMANY. An army of 300,000 men has been decided on by the confederation, to preserve the independence of the smaller states of Germany.
GREECE. The Morea is in a very desolated state, and the Mainotes are in active revolt against the Capo D'Istria. The Hydriotes and Spezziotas are also dissatisfied with the government of their President.
From le National. GREECE.—NAPOLI IN ROMANIA, March 17th.—From every quarter of the Peloponnesus murmurs are heard against the government of Greece, but especially against the fatal administration of Capo D'Istria. The President, far from acting as the provisional head of a free government, daily betrays the empire of a despot, and not infrequently the tyranny of the Council of the Ten of Venice, which he has perfected in Russia under one of the most absolute of masters.

In order not to multiply the facts, which prove Capo D'Istria's glaring abuse of authority, we will be satisfied with mentioning that Mr. A. Polyzoides, the editor of the *Philothea*, a political and literary paper, has lately addressed a protest to the Senate of Greece, animating the conduct of the President. He accuses him of having ordered, by force of arms, the seizure of the first number of his paper, and the breaking up of the presses. This illegal act of Capo D'Istria was intended to prevent the publication of an historical sketch of the events of the 27th, 28th and 29th of July.

PORTUGAL. On the 25th ult. Miguel went on horseback to the capital of St. George, and amidst acclamations of fidelity & gratitude, ordered the release of the prisoners arrested for desertion. He stood godfather to the child of an officer of his regiment, instead of the son of an officer of his regiment, which has thrown the Lisbon Gazette into an ecstasy of admiration, and which evoked a general illumination and the display of flags from the fort to the Palace of Queluz.

FRANCE. Bordeaux, April 10. A rather singular occurrence took place in this city, which proves the dexterity of some of the police agents. An individual suspected of having committed a robbery in Mirail street, had been in vain sought for during several days. Laroque, one of the agents, an old soldier, and a cunning fox to boot went to the house of a woman, who had been robbed; he there found a dog, in a usually unoccupied room, and took him along to Port Ha; there the dog was chained. On the next day the dog was led in a leash about town, but especially about the vicinity of Mirail street; he soon strained on the ropes, his movements are followed; he enters a house, rushes to the feet of an individual who was in a whining and waggish tail. The recognition between the two animals being evident, the master and dog were both taken to jail. The former will no doubt give some explanations, and account for the presence of the latter in a house, where the theft had been committed.

Mlle. de la Mars has taken leave of the stage after an undisputed reign of nearly forty years. It does not appear that her retirement has been caused by any decay of attractions, discovered by herself or hinted at by the public; it is said to proceed entirely from the low state of the finances in the Theatre Français, and we are sorry to learn that she and many other distinguished performers have suffered severely from their efforts to sustain it. The Government relieves the amusements which had hitherto been always granted, and only promises to make effect the tax of ten per cent. End on all theatres for the support of charitable institutions. It is however hardly possible to sustain this theatre from strictly classical principles. While Talma lived, this exclusive system could be sustained; by his loss, many of the finest productions of Racine, Voltaire and Corneille lost their attractions, and as the Fignro wittily observed, "the audience began to gape, and wondered they had never gaped before." With Talma and Madame Duchesnois, who are advanced in life, many other classical pieces will also disappear, and the retirement of Mlle. de la Mars will consign entirely to the library Moliere's most exquisite creations.—*N. Y. Standard.*

COMMERCIAL. Mobil, Jun 6. Cotton.—This article remains dull at our quotations, and the transactions for the last week have been very limited, owing in some measure to the scarcity of vessels. The stock on hand is unusually large.
Fruits.—We find some difficulty in giving a definite quotation of fruits to Europe. We know of the vessel *Wentworth*, for which a cargo to Liverpool has been refused at a penny per pound. 1 cent continues to be the rate to New York.

New-York, May 26th. Cotton.—We have had a good demand for Cotton since our last report of the 16th inst. The sales amount to about 3,400 bales at full former prices, comprising 1100 *Up* bales at 24 1/2 cents; 1340 *New Orleans*, 10 1/2; 30 *Texas*, 10 1/2; 300 *Florida*, 9 1/2; 100 *Indian*, 9 1/2; 100 *Spanish*, 9 1/2. The majority of the business has been in fine qualities for home use, though sales of common at about 9 cents have been made for shipment within the last three days to a considerable extent. Our importations of the 16th inst. amount to 3460 bales.
LEAD.—A few thousand pigs have arrived, prices are fully maintained.
MOULASSES.—We have to report sales of about 500 hhls *New Orleans* in different lots at 26 cents, 300 hhls *Havana* at 23 cents, 480 hhls, and for *Demarara* at 13 1/2, and some small lots *Porto-Rico* at 26 cents. The best qualities are in tolerable demand, but inferior are of full sale.

PHILADELPHIA, May 25. The market.—The Flour market continues dull, and sales of Superfine flour very limited and generally confined to small lots at \$5.50. The inferior grades, confined to small lots, are no exception. The receipts of Grain have been unusually small, and prices remain as at the close of the week. Rye Whisky continues scarce, and in demand and in barrels has sold at 33 cents. Lined Oil remains as last report.
