FRANCE. It is well known that great attention has been and, for some years past, to the improvement t the French may. Late accounts show that the government are making experiments with steam ship building on a large scale. They have, built and, building no fewer than 30 steam friga es: a semadron which, in action, ought to disday decided advantages over one compos do oarmon ships. If an occasion should be offered for an experiment of this new torm of naval war or a large scale, curiosity would be greatly exect ed to watch the result; for experiment, in such cases, often disappoints the expectations of the Lest judges; and steam has already produced rect rev lutions both on sea and land. Structure of Leaves .- A memoir, by M A. olphe Brongniart, upon the structure of leaves, and on their relation with the respiration of vegtables in air and water, has been read before the Academy of Sciences in Paris. The author states that the leaves of plants that live in the air have a totally different structure from those that the were parties to the treaty of Vienna. They are completely submerged, and that this difference in the structure of organs is in direct relation to the two principal functions of leaves, respiration and transpiration. In leaves exposed we can; if net-well, then-we know how to epidermis of uncertain thickness, formed of one or more layers of colourless cellules, closely Our city since the 25th of February has been packed together. This membrane is pierced stomata The doubts that have been entertained ipon the existence of perforations in these stonata, M. Brongaiart thinks he has removed; and that it is certain, that in the centre of each stoma is an opening by which the outer air comnumicates with the parenchyma. This parenthyma is evidently the scat of respiration; for it is the part that changes co'or in exercising this matts. function, which becomes green by the absorption of the carbon of the carbonic and of the atmosthere, and which is discolored again in darkness by the combination of the carbon of its pieces with the oxygen of the air. This parenchyma litters entirely from that of other organs by the numerous irregular cavities that it contains. which communicate with each other, and the outer oir by means of the stomata. It is into primit transports which give wings to an army; these cavities in the cavernous parenchyma of serial leaves that the atmospheric air penetrates when it is absor ed by the surface of the utri cles of the parenchyma, that are distended with the thirds which seem to noursh the plant.

According to M. Brougnart, aquatic leaves t'submerged, daffer, in being completely destrtate of equilermis. It is not alone stomata that they want, as has long been known, but the epidermis also. There are none of the cavatus that also ind in the pare neligings of nertal decycs, atter the contrary, the calcules of the tissue are coreparily fastened together without any interstice, and the air dissolved in the water can only set on their outer surface. For this reason the reportion boree by this seafner to the whole ones of the leaf is non-naily great; the leaves from wait of epidermas, day up chickly when exposed to the air, and can only exist in water, or a very hunnel atmosphere.
