EVERY thing connected with the cleanliness of the body every thing, which may act as a preventative of disease, holds its rank in the progress of hygienic medicine, which Mr. Schuller has lately enriched with the precious discovery of his Hydrogenion.

The importation into France by Mr. Walz, of the apparatus necessary to the application of this new mode of bathing, has obtained for him the approbation of the society of practical medicine, in Paris, to whom he has submitted the process, and ensured him, from the public recognition of his new apparatus, a just reward for the services which has rendered to humanity.

Generally acknowledged in Europe, being in a medicinal light, and much in that of public utility, present advantages, too numerous not to be particularly mentioned, in order to recommend, to the public of New Orleans, this apparatus, lately imported by Mr. Giquel.

The benefit obtained in a reservoir above the bath, and by the weight press, according to the laws of hydrostatics, into narrow tubes, fixed in a variety of directions, to assemble through a great number of capillary vessels, which project in the form of a water spout on the surface of the whole body, or on any of the other parts, according to the direction of the capillary apparatus.

Simple or compound, natural or artificial waters, decanters, barometres, spiritous distillations, can be done under use in the hydrogenion, and the apparatus may be employed, not only in a bath, but in shower baths, whether with cold or warm water, as applied to the head, trunk, or limbs of the body.

In practical medicine, the use of this bath, from the various modes of its application, has produced the happiest results; physicians have already obtained signal success in a variety of cases, such as, gastric obstructions, pleuritis, rheumatisms, contracted pharynx, spury tards, legions, watery swellings, of every sort, catarrhs, or a certain class of eruptions; of every variety, even to the worst kind of syphilis, weakness, and a great number of diseases in which it is equally necessary to employ animal economy.

Considered in the light of a powerful hygienic auxiliary, the use of the hydrogenion is not only salutary, but produces a healthy vigor, a development of strength, which by no means tends to diminish the faculty of the nervous process; the perfect washing of the different parts of the body, by the means of the capillary spraying, the excellent sprinkling, the general and necessary, which has the effect of restoring more activity, among the steam bath, and the latter, the former, each of these, of these, qualities of the bath, will be known to require further explanation on the subject.

The rain bath differs from the immersion bath, in this respect; that in the use of the latter, the pressure exercised by water on the body, frequently produces a very great dullness, and an itching tendency of blood to the face and neck, headaches and vertiges.

The bathy as spoken on the other hand, produces quite a contrary effect; the water, falling on the whole superfiety of the body in small drops more or less tepid, assists perspiration, a gentle effluvia is exercised in every part of the body; the process of respiration is regular; it gradually expands, the patient acquires liveliness with out feeling any fatigue, and if the expression be allowed to the articulation of every joint, except for that feeling of weakness, exertion and on the bath by immersion, it never experienced.

In conclusion the discovery of the hydrogenion can be considered as an additional hygienic domestic life, as well as account of the pleasurable sensations, which it creates, as the immense advantages of cleanliness, so very salutary to the body.

Baths, with Mr. Walz' apparatus can be taken warm, cold, or cold; as also medicated, mucous, alkaline, (syring or steam and shower baths, the usefulness of which is very great though generally disregarred on account of the high expenses and infinite care attending the establishment of steam baths at home.

This new apparatus independently of the little space, which they take up in a room no ways interferes with the service of a household; and if the mere trifling details be taken into consideration offers a saving of time, fuel and water. Manufactured in the shape of a sunny apparatus, this same apparatus can adorn a dressing room, a parlor, or the most modest tenement; in the form of a book case or of a press it may be found an indispensable desideratum in a household.
