London, May 30. The French ministers are reported to have determined, in order to secure manajority in the Chamber of Deputies, to remove, before the election, all prefects who cannot be reckoned upon; to coppose more especially all moderate royalists, so as to compel the people to choose between the extreme right and extreme left; to promise the electors all corts of advantages if they comply with the ministry; and, fastly, to issue a Roy al proclamation before the election, calling upon all Frenchmen to raily round th: throne and altar. When the Coambers are assembled, they are to be adroitly reminded of the face of their predecessors; the budget, if the address in answer to the Raval speech is not insoleat, is to be the first law proposed, and in case of non-compliance, the Cham hers are to be immediately dissolved .-If it should be necessary to proceed to menther election, the number of electors Is to be reduced by Royal authority, and all persons are to be declared ineligible who adhered to Napoleon during the hundred days. In the mean time, by the 14th article of the Charter, the King will cause Exchequer bills to be insued to provide for the exigencies of the State, and if the payment of the indirect taxes should be resisted, it is proposed to enforce them by military execution. If on convoking the Chambers a third time, it should still be found impossible to manage them, it is resolved that the battle of Royalism shall then be fought, and military force and fortign sid be called in, to destroy effectually all the remaining fruits of the revoluregion Such are said to be the schemes of the French ministry.
