Havana, August 10.
VICTORY OF THE FRENCH!
CAPTURE OF ALGIERS!!
Capt. J. A. Villar, of the Spanish *Velas*, arrived yesterday in 30 days, and informs us, that on the day of an Austrian brig of war arrived from Africa, bringing the agreeable news of the French having taken possession of the city of Algiers on the 19th of July, after bombarding it several days.

The loss of the French, it is thought, was considerable, the weather being calm at the time they took possession of the forts, the smoke from their fire and that from the batteries being so dense that the fleet were unable to see the colors flying, and ceased bombarding the city several hours before the French entered—it was this, without doubt, which occasioned a great loss to the victors.

Letters from Havana of the 13th inst. received per brig *Josephine*, arrived this morning, gives the same news as the above—it states the loss of the French at 10 to 12,000 men; and that of the Algerines at triple that number.

New-York, Aug. 5.
From Liverpool.—By the ship *Italy*, Capt. Putnam, the Liverpool Journal of June 26th, has been received. We find no later intelligence in it from the Continent, and no new items of any general importance.

The *Major* steam boat arrived at Liverpool on the 25th of June from Corfu. She passed close by Algiers on the 8th of June, and exchanged signals with the British and American Consuls on shore.

The King.—The Times of the 24th says, the intelligence from Windsor is distressing. The moment of the dissolution of our beloved monarch is very near.

The Globe of the same evening does not contain a bulletin of that day, but the ditto remarks that the public are hourly expecting the sad intelligence of his Majesty's death.

Windsor Castle, June 23.—The King cough continues, with considerable expectation. His Majesty has slept at intervals in the night, but complains of great languor to-day.

London, June 23d, evening.—In the funds during the week, very little has been done. It is a holiday this day. Consols may be quoted as they left off yesterday, 92 7/8.

Liverpool, June 25, sailed Edgar Vaughn. New-York; Delta, Wood, Virginia.

Algiers.—The Boston Palladium, in announcing the arrival of the *Beagle*, says:—"We learn, from the passengers, that intelligence was received at Gibraltar, the day before she sailed, that the French had taken possession of the heights which command Algiers, and the city in four places, and were about to enter it."

New-York, August 4.
From Cadiz.—We are indebted to a commercial friend for the loan of Cadiz papers to the 23d June, and a Price Current of the 22d.

The paper of the 13th contains a long edict, dated the day previous, which has a particular bearing upon the commerce of the United States. It is a renewal, with some modifications, of the edict of 13th June 1829. It declares that the only mode of preserving Cadiz from the yellow fever, is to debar from the port, during the hot season, vessels proceeding from the Gulf of Mexico, the Antilles, and other places where the disease is endemic. It is therefore decreed, that vessels leaving the ports of America in the circle of the Gulf of Mexico, from the mouth of the Orinoco to the Bahama Channel, between the 1st of July and the end of October in each year, shall be sent from the port of Cadiz to the Lazaretto of Mahon. Vessels arriving from the said ports between the middle and end of June, or between the 1st and the Middle of November, however healthy they may be, shall be treated as suspicious, and subjected to 14 days surveillance and 20 days expurgation of the goods, tackle, &c.

Vessels from the U. States of America, other than ports included in the Gulf of Mexico, if they have set sail between the beginning of June and the end of September, are made subject to eight days observation, together with the purification of the crew and so much of the cargo as is susceptible,—bringing clean bills of health, certified by the respective Spanish Consuls,—with only

tude, with similar documents and dates of departure, shall be regarded as suspicious. In the port of Cadiz, and those of the Cantabrian Gulf open to the commerce of America, vessels from places in the Gulf of Mexico will be admitted under the character of suspicious, from July to the end of October, however healthy they may be; but in case will those be admitted whose bills of health are foul.

In St. Audoere the place appropriated for the purposes of disinfection is the Lazaretto of the Isle of Pedrosa; in Bilbao, that of Z.rossa.

Pilots are forbidden, under the severest penalties, to pilot vessels which, coming directly from prohibited ports of the United States, between the 1st of June and end of October, shall attempt to enter without first having undergone purification in the appointed Lazaretto.

Vessels arriving from any unprohibited port, shall anchor close to the vessel of war in the advanced line of bay, where they shall be visited and passed upon by the Health Officer.

Those vessels which are to undergo quarantine, shall observe it *pro tem*, near to and under the vigilance of the ship of war stationed at the entrance of the bay, and the Guards of Health who are placed over them, shall take care that the ventilation of the ship is rigorously executed. The Commissioners of the bay, as well as the guard-ship, shall assist in the matter, fully assured that the least omission or want of attention, their immediate dismissal from office, with additional penalties as it shall be deemed proper to impose.

Much dissatisfaction seems to exist in Cadiz, on account of the direct taxes levied upon the citizens to fill up the amount pledged by the local authorities to the general government, for the privilege of possessing a free port. Mean while the Junta Directiva are making all sorts of changes in their system of contributions, in order to accommodate it more perfectly to the wishes, and even the prejudices of the people.

From the New-York Gazette.

Trinidad papers to the 24th June have been received at Quebec. They give deplorable accounts of the Crops, in the different West India Islands, owing to the wet weather that had been experienced. The following extract, from the Grenada Free Press, of the 2d June, is contained in the Trinidad Chronicle of the 19th:—

A few days in the latter part of last week were partially dry, but the weather by no means had a settled appearance. Heavy showers again fell yesterday, and it has rained almost incessantly this forenoon. The hope of getting off the remaining part of the crop upon many estates is, we believe, abandoned. Accounts from the neighboring Colonies give deplorable descriptions of the effects of the heavy incessant rains; and in Antigua, so remarkable for suffering by the effects of the drought, it is stated (in the Free Press of the 14th May) that the damage sustained by "so large a succession of heavy rains," will shorten the present crop about 3,000 hogs-heads.

Two letters from Trinidad have also been received, one of them dated June 19, says:—"The weather continues dreadful since the 1st instant, we have had rain night and day. The ships are obliged to sail in ballast, or with only part of a cargo." One of a later date, (June 25,) contains the following additional particulars:—"The weather is so bad that it is impossible to procure Sugar even at the price of 45s. per H. which is the price offered. Our European ships are sailing, after having remained here five or six months, only half loaded, and a great number in ballast. Five or six sailed this week in ballast. It is truly ruinous to the planters."

E. the Vice President of Mexico, from the moment he entered upon the executive duties of the said states, has considered as sacred all the obligations of the nation, and has taken the most active measures to enable the Government to fulfil all its existing obligations, and it being necessary that all claims should be presented and substantiated before H. E. can take such further steps as may be necessary for their liquidation and payment: Therefore, H. E. the Vice President, has directed the undersigned to give notice, that such citizens of the U. States who may have claims against the Government of Mexico, as aforesaid, are hereby invited to present the same, duly authenticated, to the Mexican Legation at Baltimore, within the term of four

Paris, June 17.

The *Journal du Maine et Loire*, intitled *Le Royaliste*, contains to day the following letter:—

"Sir,—I was a spectator of the arrangements made yesterday for the arrival of the two ex-Deputies of the Maine and Loire. The Royalists have no reason to fear that such scenes will be repeated often.

"The two Honourables were announced for six o'clock in the evening. A considerable number of young men had made preparations to give to their entry the appearance of a triumph; a kind of uniform was adopted by them, and they proceeded on horseback to meet the expected personages. But a number of other young men, of opinions totally different, had determined also to meet them, and to manifest, with firmness, their disapprobation of men who only recommended themselves by a culpable attack on the Royal Prerogative. The superior authority, apprised of the contest which was likely to take place, immediately adopted the most wise and vigorous measures. By virtue of a decree of the Prefect, the armed force occupied on the road from Paris a position, where the triumphal car was stopped rather rudely. In vain did the escort redouble their cries and agitation; the barrier remained shut. Let us now cast a coup d'œil on the epistolical scenes.

"An innumerable crowd had posted themselves on the Paris-road, but, with the exception of the actors, who might be easily counted, all the rest had proceeded only from a desire to see what was going on. The enthusiasm of the 23 pts did not convert a single individual, and their cries of "Vive la Charte!" did not find any echoes. These gentlemen may rest assured that the people will never espouse a quarrel altogether foreign to their interests.

"On the terrace of a garden, close to the road-side, a number of zealots, in the prescribed costume, impatiently waited for the objects of their worship. Useless expectation!

"Instead of traversing the crowd, the ex Deputies condescended to take a circuitous route, and to make their entry modestly on foot by the bridge of La Challoire. The word of command was rapidly given that a number of young men might proceed to this point. Their cries of "Long live the Charter!—Long live our Deputy!—Long live the left!—Long live liberty!—Long live the 121!" and a number of other cries; which, no doubt, not understood by the majority of those who uttered them, received the fallen triumphators on their passage. The crowd accompanied them to their houses, wished them a good night, and notwithstanding the disappointments of the day, retired, enchanted at having well supported the march of liberalism, and, probably, at having saved the country.

"The effervescence of these young liberals had more than once excited apprehensions of tragic scenes. They would have taken place but for the extreme and praise-worthy prudence of the public authorities, who had been more than once insulted, and but for the armed force which had been justly as well as pleasantly enough called the *Sûreté* *Gordon*.

"The *Constitutionnel* says that the gendarmerie charged the crowd, and that a house at which the ex-Deputies intended to alight had been surrounded by an armed force, which prevented them from carrying their design into execution. This the *Gazette de France*, however, denies."

Longevity.—A remarkable instance of longevity is mentioned in one of our late Paris papers. A poor man, near Lake Trasimene, in the Papal States died lately at the extraordinary age of one hundred and twenty three years and eleven months. He is said to have led a life of constant activity, and never to have had recourse to medicine. He preserved the use of his faculties to the last. In 1825, Pope Leo XII. being made acquainted with his history, granted him a pension of nine crowns a month, which he enjoyed until his death.

An affecting account is given of the separation of the naval and military chiefs, at the moment of the landing they embraced, and M. Duperré said to M. de Bourmont: "I am yours for life and for death. You may count upon me." This scene is gravely related.

A piano Forte, upon a new principle, has been invented by Mr. Sakmeister, of New York, and is said to be the subject of much enthusiasm among the musical professors of that city. Its position is horizontal, with a newly-invented grand action, and it combines all the ne-

sweet, and capable of being varied from the soft notes of the harp almost to the swell of an organ. The mechanism is such that the feeling of the player can be almost instantaneously directed to the string.
