LATE AND IMPORTANT FROM ENGLAND. Whitehall, June 26, A Bulletin, of which the following is a copy, has been this morning received by Secretary Sir Robert Peel...

Windsor Castle, June 26.—It has pleased Almighty God to take from this world the King's Most Excellent Majesty. His Majesty expired at a quarter past 3 o'clock this morning without pain.

In the course of Friday evening, before nine o'clock, the physicians intimated to their royal patient their inability to give him further relief, and their opinion that his last moments were rapidly approaching...

THE ACCESSION OF WILLIAM IV.

His Majesty William IV. arrived at St. James Palace a few moments before twelve o'clock on Saturday, and appeared to be in excellent health. The King entered the State-room, in which the throne is placed, about one o'clock...

"I am convinced that you will fully participate in the affliction which I am suffering on account of the loss of a Sovereign, under whose auspices, as Regent and as King, this country has maintained during war its ancient reputation and glory..."

"After having passed my life in the service of my country, and having, I trust, uniformly acted as the most faithful subject and servant of the King, I am now called upon, under the dispensation of Almighty God, to administer the Government of this great empire..."

Whereupon the Lords of the Council made it their humble request to his Majesty that his Majesty's most gracious declaration to their Lordships might be made public, which his Majesty was pleased to order accordingly.

The extracts from the French papers, furnish us with some additional particulars on the two great topics of interest in that country—the expedition against Algiers, and the elections. The Journal du Commerce of the 26th says, that of 175 nominations which were then known, the opposition had obtained 122, and the ministry 53. One hundred vo-

ters of the address had already been rejected, and had been reinforced by 22 deputies, who were not of the last Chamber. The ministerial list consisted of the 181 who opposed the address, and of 10 new deputies.

The second edition of the Messenger of the 28th says, that of the 193 deputies elected on the 23d, but four remain to be known. The constitutional deputies of every description amount to 144; ministerial to 49.

The same paper contains an account of an engagement that had taken place between the French & Turks before Algiers. The positions of the former were attacked by the enemy, 40,000 strong, on the 19th of June. The French opposed but 25,000 fighting men, the rest being necessary to protect the landing of the material from the fleet.

The Algerines made the attack with great impetuosity, and it is stated that the great utility of the precautionary measures of the chevaux de frize, were fully tested. They were found very effectually in defending the infantry from the hordes of Arab cavalry.

On the retreat of the Algerines, the troops were thrown into great disorder. The camp in the rear for which they retreated in horrible confusion, hotly pursued by the French, who carried the camp on the same day.

An official bulletin from Admiral Duperré is also given, in which it is stated that the landing of the materiel continues to go on with activity. The weather is spoken by both Count Bourmont and Duperré as "magnificent."

FRANCE AND ALGIERS.

From the Monitor. To His Excellency the President of the Council of Ministers.

"Prince.—The enemy had occupied since the 15th, the camp of Stranelli. On the 17th and 18th they had shown, in front of our position, fewer men than on the preceding days, however, they had received considerable reinforcements. On the 18th, in the evening, the contingents of Constantia, Oran, and Titeri, and a great part of the Turkish militia of Algiers, had united. The force of these several corps, amounted to about forty thousand men. Their confidence was the greater as the French army had remained for four days immovable in its position."

resolution. Some Janissaries penetrated into the trenches which covered the front of our battalions—they met their death. The third brigade of the division of Berthezene, and the two first brigades of the division of Loverdo, were attacked by the contingents of Constantia and Oran.—After having suffered the enemy to advance to the bottom of the ravine which covered the position, Gen. Loverdo charged them at the point of the bayonet. Many of the Arab infantry were killed. After having repulsed the enemy, the brigade of Clouet resumed the offensive. The ardour of the troops was such that it would have been difficult to restrain them. The brigades of Achard and Poret de Morvan then advanced to support the brigade of Clouet. The decisive moment was come. Forged the attack of the enemies batteries and camp. The two first brigades of the division of Lover-

do, led by General Damremont d'Uzur, marched first; the third brigade which had been detached to the right, followed, under the command of Gen. d'Arcine, the movement of the brigades of Clouet. Three regiments of the division of Hecers advanced to form the reserve. It would be difficult to point out the enthusiasm which the troops manifested when the order to attack the camp was given. The march was performed with extraordinary rapidity. In spite of the difficulties of the ground, the artillery, which was all of the new model, was always the first in line.

The conduct of the troops of all arms has answered the confidence of the King. Most of the officers of the staff were not mounted; they did their duty on foot, with indefatigable ardor. Lieut. Gen. Berthezene led his division with the talent and coolness that were expected from his long experience.

The number of the wounded amounts to about 300; the wounds are in general not very dangerous; and the half of those who have received them will return to their duty. The landing continues with great activity; many horses have been put on shore to day, and a still greater number will be landed tomorrow. The weather is magnificent; the summer, which had been backward, appears to have begun at last.

The Arabs are discouraged; several of them have already presented themselves at our outposts; they agree in saying that their fear of the Dey has made them march against the French army. The defeat of Stranelli may give occasion to numerous desertions. I have the honor to be, &c. (Signed) COUNT DE BOURMONT.

LIVERPOOL, July 1st. 1830.—The transactions in our Cotton market last week were extensive, and 29,486 bales of all descriptions found buyers, viz:—90 Sea Islands at 13 a 16d; 30 Stained at 7 1-2d; 8610 Upland—3595 at 6 1-4 a 7 1-4d; 15 at 5 3-4d; 6490 Orleans at 6 1-4 a 8 1-4d; 4140 Alabama at 6 1 8 a 7 1-4d; 6610 Brazil at 7 1-4 a 8 1-4d; 410 Egyptian at 7 1-2 a 9d; 90 W. India at 7 5-8 a 8 7-8d; 3010 Surat at 4 1-2 a 5 7-8d.

The arrivals of Cotton thus far this week have been considerable, and the market less animated; there is however a disposition to purchase provided holders will submit to some reduction in prices; the sales for five days past are computed at 12,000 bales.
