RUSSIA AND TURKEY. The Courier Francaise gives the following, as contained in a letter from Corfu dated May 21, and addressed to one of the first commercial houses at Naples:—"A convention has been concluded between the government of Russia and the Ottoman Porte, whereby the latter engages not to enter into any Treaty in favor of the Poles, on condition of being allowed to recover possession of Greece, and the Islands of the Archipelago detached from its authority by the late Treaty. Consequently the Island of Negropont and Attica will not be evacuated. The fortresses of the Peloponnesus will be delivered to the Grand Seignor, who will establish a Pacha in the Morea, with some stipulations in favor of certain Christians, as the Valachians and the Moldavians. It is said that Count Capo d'Istrias has long been aware of these designs of the Russian Cabinet. It appears also that since these schemes of Russia have become known, a general alarm has spread the Ionian Islands, and that the English complain loudly against this act of Machiavelian policy.

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
