2dly. That, the Mexican Consuls and a perior agents shall not grant their bills of health from the Baltic, the commercial intercourse of their ports with those of the Republic being from this time forth suspended.

3dly. That, the said agent in expediting the said documents, not only shall inform themselves of the state of health of the vessels, but also of the place from whence the goods have been brought, absolutely refusing them to such vessels as proceed from any quarter where it is known that the enidemic prevails. 4thly. That, the moment the said epidemic

extends to any port or quarter, where vessels, passengers, or effects are expedited to the Reas the cause that rendered the adoption of sucl measures necessary shall have entirely ceased. 5thly. That, as soon as this communication be recived, the regulations contained therein be published in the journals not only of the country in which each Legation or consulate is resident, but also in the intermediate ones, for the infor-

6thly That, the measures shall remain in full effect the whole time the epidemic prevails in any country, the Government of the Republic reserving to itself the right of applying them henceforwad to sue vessels, persons, or effects as proceed from the quarters already infected or in the vicinity of the contagion-H.
