The Chinese viceroy and other officed refuse to receive remonstrances or any communication from the E. I. Company's agents regarding this outrage—in fact, I believe all intercourse has ceased. The "Bonon Upan Tree."—The article alluded to by the writer of the following note, was published in this, and many other papers, sometime in the year 1830. We have many accounts relative to this singular tree, but the following statements, by an intelligent and highly respectable gentleman, who has resided in the sland of Java for a number of years, come nearer the truth, we believe, than any we have yet seen, and it is with no small degree of pleasure we give them a place in our columns: To the Editor of the Lansingburgh Gazette-liatavia, (Java,) April 15, 1831.

DEAR SIR-In the New York Evening Post f Dec 6, 1830, I observed an article headed the "Bohon Upns Tree," purporting to be facts ta-ken from the journal of a Botanist, sent by the Emperor Napoleon to this country in 1810.

The Bohon Upas grows on almost every forest on the island; b.t the story from which the Botarist has taken his remarks is all a fable, and such a tree as he describes, possessed of such deadly qualities as to affect the atmosphere for miles in circumference, does mit exist. A short time since, when in the country, I sat under the Bohon Upas, from which the natives procured a substance for poisoning their weathe and, and a substance thus precured mixed with the juice of lemons is rubbed on the blade. The botonist observes, the "poison is a gum, which like camphor, issues from the bark."ow camphor being of a dry nature, does no exede from the tree, or manifest any appearance on the outside. The natives, from long experience know whether any is contained with-in, by striking it with a stick. In that case they cut it down and apig it with wedges into small pieces, finding the damphor, in the inter-stices in the state of a concrete chrystalization. Thus you see the comparison is not a good one

and he knew nothing of the camphor tree. Some of the Java weapons are so poisons as to require but a slight incision to deprive one of life in a very few moments, but it is neeassary to renew the poison every few years as age destroys in a great measure its strength.
I hope you will give the above publication, as the rising generation may know, that although the Botton Upas affords poison for the native's wearens, it is not possessed of these deadly qualities so often related, and that vegetation be neath its branches is as fourishing as at any distance from it, and the traveller may rest his weary limbs beneath its shade without the fear

The name in the Javanese language means Bohon, tree; Upas, poison.
