> Are the growers of cotton protected? The inhabitants of this state consumes masufactured goods to a the same population. Upon all the articles, or the grea ter part of them, they pay a duty indirectly, under the protecting system. And the sums which they pay, no doubt will amount to four times the amount of protection extended to the sugar planterst. Since the late to. duction of duties on augars, Louisiana is again reduced nearly to a revenue protection. This system has been protecting us with a vengeance. 'For every dollar which the augar planter received as a protection, the other interests in the state paid at least four; and under the late tariff will pay in a ratio some what greater. It is a strange abuse of names to call a system protecting, which, whilst it puts into one man's pocket a dollar, filches four dollars from the pockets of his neighbours. But the paramount objection is the assumption of a power of so great a magnitude by congress without any constitutional authority.
