ACT
(By authority.)
To amend the act entitled "An act to incorporate the subscribers to the Union Bank of Louisiana."
SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, in General Assembly convened, That for the discounting of notes, five directors will form a quorum; and that five bills of exchange or other effects, a committee of three members of the board of directors, appointed by a majority of the board, shall form a quorum.

SECTION 2. And be it further enacted, That the Branch of the Union Bank, which according to the thirty-third section of the Charter of that institution, is to be established at Markville, may be located in any other part of the parish of Avoyelles, which the board of directors of the mother Bank will deem more convenient; provided, this measure shall have been previously recommended by the majority of the directors of the Branch Bank located in the parish of Avoyelles.
