tion—the expense of fixtures on the hill, at the wharf where the stone is tanded, and at the quarry—and the quantity of stone (not leas than two thousand tons) already prepared, it is stated by the intelligent and accurate architect, Solomon Willard, esq. in his printed expession in 1830, that the work is twe-thirds completed. From the data furnished by him, it appears that the expense of raising 110 the height of 200 feet will be \$25,925. To cover any excess over this estimate, (which, however, in a work two-thirds completed cannot be great) and to enclose and plant the field with trees, it may be safe to assume \$30,000 as the min required to finish the monument. The Ladius' Fund, on interest which is exclusively appropriated to this object amounts to something more than \$3000. The property of the Association, to be disposed of after the monument shall have been finished, will, it is believed, produce \$4500, leaving a sum ion-the expense of fixtures on the hill, at the wharf whe finished, will, it is believed, produce \$4500, leaving a sum of \$22,500 requisite to be raised to complete the structure.
