This suit can, in all probability, (as a general desire seems to vist to that effect) be imally decided in a month or two; and if the decision should be in favor of the State, then there will exist no necessity for the State to borrow money to meet us bonds; but as uncertainty hangs over this matter; and as the faith and the credit of the State are of too sacred a nature, in the eyes of your Committee, to be copardised on any account; your Committee think it their imperative duty to recommend to the Legislature of the State which become due on the lat of July next.
