State of Louisiana. TWELFTH LEGISLATURE—1st SESSION. JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

Tuesday, 13th January, 1835.
The Senate met agreeably to adjournment.
Members present: Messrs. Chas. Derbigny, President, Bossier, Brownson, Dupré, Ho, Labranche, Lacoste, Maddox, Moore, Nicholas, Reeds, Saunders, Tenney, and Tété.
On motion of Mr. Saunders, a plan, belonging to Mr. Zimpel, filed in the Senate, last year, by the member from New-Orleans, accompanying a petition relative to a Rail-Road to Nashville, was ordered to be returned to the owner.
Mr. Saunders presented a petition signed H. A. Ballard praying assistance for two deaf and dumb orphan boys, by the name of Harris.
On motion of Mr. Saunders the petition was referred to a committee. The president appointed Messrs. Saunders and Dupré on the same.
Reading of Messages from the House.
A resolution granting leave of absence to H. Péleclaux, notary public.

The resolution presented yesterday by Moore, ordering the secretary to subscribe to the Red River Chronicle, for the use of the Senate, was adopted.
Mr. Moore presented the following resolution:
Resolved, that Henry P. Leconte be appointed stenographer for the Senate during the session, and he be allowed for his services the same pay that the enrolling clerk receives.
Mr. Labauay, according to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled: "An act to amend the code of practice and the code of procedure, amending the code of procedure, passed March 25th, 1831." Read for the first time.
A message in writing from the House, brought by Mr. E. Wiltz, his private secretary.
On motion of Mr. Labauay, the doors were closed for the purpose of going into executive session.
After the doors were opened, at 10 o'clock, Mr. Saunders the Senate adjourned on Monday, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The senate met agreeably to adjournment.
Members present: Messrs. Chas. Derbigny, President, Bossier, Brownson, Ho, Labranche, Lacoste, Maddox, Moore, Nicholas, Porche, Reeds, Saunders, Tenney et Tété.
M. Bossier, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled "An act to amend an act to furnish arms to the volunteer companies in the State, approved 19th Nov. 1831."
Read for the first time.
M. Ho gave notice to-morrow he would introduce a bill entitled "An act to amend the 1st and 3d sections of an act entitled 'An act for the relief of the parish of Orleans, approved 6th March 1830.'"
Mr. Bossier presented a petition from Ambrose, and Sophronie L. Oubroux, praying for emancipation. Referred to committee of three, composed of Messrs. Bossier, Ho, and Porche.
M. Ho presented a petition from the New-Orleans Rail Road Company, praying for an increase of their capital.
A message from the House, by M. A. Pezard, requested the concurrence of the Senate in resolutions and acts entitled, which were read for the first time.

the commercial and agricultural interests of the country.
Although in the opinion of some, the Board are at present authorized to take mortgages on property in the city to secure shares, it is desirable that this right should be expressly conferred.

Mr. Brownson, on part of the committee, which was referred the petition of the inhabitants of the city of Lafayette, reported a bill entitled "An act to enlarge the jurisdiction of the parish court of the parish of Jefferson, and to transfer the court to be styled the City Court of the parish of Lafayette."
On motion of Mr. Brownson, a bill was ordered to be introduced, fixing the date of the first division of the land, and to amend, and to be referred to the committee to be appointed to examine the affairs of the Bank.

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Resolved that our Senators and Representatives in Congress be requested to use their exertions to obtain a grant of land for the purposes of public education in the state of Louisiana.
Resolved that a joint committee of both Houses of the State of Louisiana, composed of three from the Senate and... the House of Representatives be appointed to examine the navigation of the Pontchartraine Navigation Company, and to report to their respective Houses, and to say whether, from their examination of said bill, you, the company has not forsook their obligations under the territorial laws, and if forsook, to report by bill, making it the duty of the attorney general to bring suit against said company for the reinstating said bayou to the public as if not chartered.
Mr. Davidson presented a petition signed by sundry cotton dealers in this city, addressed to the planters of cotton in the State of Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, and North Alabama, and other shippers of cotton for sale to the city of New Orleans.
On motion ordered that the same be laid on the table until the House takes up the consideration of the bill relative to cotton weavers.
Mr. Lawrence offered the following resolutions:
Whereas an opinion is prevailing among the good people of the State of Louisiana that taxation in said state is enormously high and disproportionate to their numbers and means to pay, and the productive labour of the state, and whereas it is also believed that the government of the state costs the good people thereof an amount sufficient to defray the expense of six or eight of the governments of the other states of the Union, and that the public treasury has been uselessly and extravagantly expended for improper objects, and whereas it is undoubted right of the people to have their govern-

ment administered in the cheapest and most economical manner, consistent with the public good, thereupon be it resolved that a committee of nine members, selected from the different judicial districts of the state, be appointed to investigate the causes of the high taxation of the state, and report to the House the result of their investigation.
Resolved that said committee be instructed and is hereby required to ascertain the amount of taxes assessed and collected in each of the parishes of the state, for the last five years, as well as the number of officers, and the respective amounts paid by each officer in the several parishes throughout the state during that time.
Resolved that the governor be requested to communicate with the governors of the several states of the Union in relation to the annual expense of the different state governments, and to lay before said committee, such information as he may be enabled to obtain.
Resolved that said committee report to the House the reasons why taxation is so much higher in the State of Louisiana than in the other states of the Union, if they find such to be the fact, as well as the means of reducing the expenses of the government of the state, if it is thought expedient by said committee, so to do.
Resolved that each of the governor's messages relating to the assessment, collection, and payment of the public revenues be referred to said committee.

On motion ordered that the same be adopted.
Mr. Richardson presented a petition of Louis Hebert, of the parish of St. Charles, praying for the emancipation of his slaves.
On motion ordered that the same be referred to the committee to be appointed to examine the affairs of the Bank.
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On motion of Mr. Breed, the House took up the resolution fixing the day for the election of a major general, which had been laid on the table a few days past.
Mr. Shields moved to amend the same by inserting the words, "this day at one o'clock, in lieu of the words, "Friday the 21st instant at one o'clock."
Said motion having been lost.
Mr. Antonio Ducros offered as an amendment to say, to-morrow 14th instant at one o'clock.
Said motion having also been lost.
Mr. Montegut offered as an amendment, "to be read at 1 1/2 o'clock."
Said motion having prevailed.
On motion ordered that said resolution be adopted.
The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said resolution such as amended.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The House took up the bill coming from the Senate entitled: "An act to amend an act to incorporate the Commercial Insurance Company approved 6th March 1834, which was read for the first time and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.
The House then took up the resolution requesting our Senators and Representatives in Congress to use their exertions to obtain a grant of land for the purposes of public education in the State of Louisiana.
On motion ordered that the same be adopted.
The clerk was directed to inform the Senate thereof. The House then took up the resolution also coming from the Senate, relative to the pontchartraine Navigation Company.
The same having been amended, on motion ordered that said resolution be laid on the table subject to the call of the House.
Mr. Richardson moved for the reconsideration of the resolution passed this day at half past one o'clock, for the purpose of a major general.
Said motion having prevailed, the House took up said resolution.
Mr. Richardson offered as an amendment the words "the day of the month of January the 13th, 1835." Said amendment having been adopted,
On motion ordered that said resolution be adopted as amended.
The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in the same.

The following bills were read for a second time and ordered for a third reading on to-morrow.
An act further to amend the charter of the West Feliciana Rail-Road Company.
An act giving certain powers to the police jury of the parish of Livingston.
An act to incorporate the New-Orleans gazette and banking company.
An act to change the time of holding the sessions of the district courts of the 8th Judicial district in the State of Louisiana.
An act to authorize the purchase and distribution of a certain number of copies of Benjamin and Siddle's digest of the decisions of the superior court of the late territory of Orleans and of the Supreme Court of the State of Louisiana.
An act establishing the western boundary of the parish of Catahoula.
The House then took up the resolution requesting our Senators and Representatives in Congress to use their best exertions to procure an appropriation of money from Congress for improving the navigation of Red-River.
On motion ordered that the same be adopted.
The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said resolution.
The House then took up the resolution appointing a joint committee to examine into the affairs and situation of the Louisiana State-Bank.
On motion ordered that the same be adopted.
The Speaker appointed Messrs. Antonio Ducros, Montegut, and Vanille, members of said committee on behalf of the House.
The clerk was directed to inform the Senate thereof and request the concurrence in said resolution.
The House then took up the resolution relative to the creation of a Parish in the parish of Manchac.
The same having been amended,
The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said resolution.
The House then resumed the consideration of the bill entitled: "An act to incorporate the New-Orleans and Nashville Rail-Road Company."
On motion ordered that the further consideration of said bill be postponed until to-morrow.
The bill entitled: "An act to incorporate the subscribers to an association for the purpose of building a Hotel in the city of New-Orleans," was taken up.
On motion ordered that the same be taken section by section.
The several sections thereof having been adopted,
On motion ordered that said bill do pass and retain its title.
The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in the same.
The House then took up the bill entitled: "An act to incorporate the subscribers to an association for the purpose of building an Exchange in the city of New-Orleans."
On motion ordered that the same be taken section by section.
The two first sections having been adopted, the third and last section rejected.
On motion ordered that said bill do pass as amended and retain its title.
The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said bill.
The House then took up the bill entitled: "An act specifying alterations and amendments to the constitution of the State of Louisiana and for taking the sense of the people on the expediency of calling a convention."
On motion ordered that the further consideration of said bill be postponed until to-morrow.
The House then took up the bill entitled: "An act to incorporate the Ocean Insurance Company."
On motion ordered that the same be taken section by section.
