**GRAND LODGE OF PENNSYLVANIA.**  
The following is an extract from the very important Address of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, dated the 15th of May last, and published in the Bee of the 17th inst. It is a most interesting and valuable document, and one which every citizen should read and treasure up.

While we join in the sad and solemn cry every where uttered by our countrymen, in relation to the attention of the National Congress to the rights of the colored people, we cannot but own our deep sympathy, and our hearty cooperation, in every effort to secure to them the same rights and privileges as are enjoyed by the white race.

Some days ago we published an extract from the "Constitutional Declaration" concerning a project to incorporate a new State, to be called "Panama," which has fallen into our hands, from which we have derived some authentic information regarding this most interesting project. It is a document of some length, and contains many interesting particulars, which we have endeavored to condense into a few lines, for the use of our readers.

We find a considerable degree of interest in giving publicity to the Memorial which Mr. Paredes presented to the National Congress, and which is now before the Executive Council, for a moment's delay, that body will receive a project upon which depends the future happiness of a large portion of the human race, and which will have a most important bearing upon the relations between the Atlantic and the Pacific, and upon the navigation of the great Isthmus of Panama, which is now so much the subject of the public mind.

## THE WHALE FISHERY.

A correspondent of the Boston Atlas furnishes some interesting particulars in relation to the Whaling business, which is an ancient and profitable one. It is now carried on by no less than 175 ships, engaged in this business, and has increased in value and extent since the late war. The whaling ships are built in New England, and are of various sizes, from 100 to 300 tons. They are fitted out with crews of 20 to 30 men, and are sent to the whaling grounds in the North Atlantic, where they remain for several months, during which they catch and bale the whales.
