The federal constitution is alike the fundamental and su remerlaw of the United States: what it enjoins cannot b gainsaid by any state accepting its provisions without revolution; nor by citizens of any state. That in trument does indeed enjoin that 'the ciuzons of each state shall be entitled to all the privileges and immunities of citizens of other states;' but it enjoins equally that congress shall adopt a uniform law of naturalization; and that citizens so naturalized shall be eligible to all privileges and im munities as native citizens-except to be elected president and vicepresident of the U. States.

This is the broad charter of freemen; the basis of repi licanism; the guarantee of liberty; and the security, safety and permanence of our population, peace and prosperity. ng as the present law of margralization is continued; so long must this salutary system be continued. But should attempt be made by our bluelight federalists of th nodern school of whige, to revive the alien and sedition laws, then may we again apprehend the 'abomination of desolation' that had been so ably decried by Jefferson. Madison, Monroe, Jackson, and all the approved great men o the great republican democratic party throughout this union

The period has not yet arrived when it might be judiciou or politic to deny foreigners the advantages of adopting Amer ca as their home or refuge. It is indeed advantageous for Louisiana to he populated with intelligent persone; but it is perfectly immaterial to her, whether those persons have been born in other states or in other countries They become her citizens without distinction; and are now equally entitled to all her privileges. When she denies those privileges to foreigners, she must in selfdelence or reciprocul justice deny them also to American citizens not born in the Mate. This is precisely the enject which would eventually and equitably be obtained by pursuing the system of exclusion, now so shamefully persued by a few-and thank God but hy a few-of those who term themselves American citisens; yet who perhaps have few other qualifications to resommend them.
