The races on the New Iberia course commenced today. GALLOTT.—Before the course of the fall, our citizens may reasonably expect that the greater part of the incorporated districts of the city will have been lighted with gas.

That the city should be lighted with gas in preference to the present system, cannot be denied or doubted; and all will admit that the sooner the contract is made, and the work commenced, so much the better for the city.

When the mayor vetoed the last ordinance on this subject, he did it on the grounds presumed that the charges for lamps, posts, etc. were too extravagant. Let them therefore be moderate; and all objections are obviated.

The suit of the Rev. Spencer Will against Mr. Talbot for violation of contract and defamation, was tried last week, in Attakapas. The trial continued from Monday till Thursday noon; the jury deliberated till Friday; but not returning on a verdict, were discharged.

It is indeed immaterial of what the prop for the awning may consist; nor perhaps need any difference be made concerning their quality and quantity. But it is material that whether they consist of posts, columns or pillars, they should be of an uniform height throughout the city.

It is understood that the instructions from this Department to receive for the public only such state bank notes as the deposite banks are willing to credit at, have been construed to authorize the receipt of such notes of any denomination. The undersigned considers it highly beneficial to the currency of the country and the safety of the banking institutions, to limit the receipt of such notes to the more general use of specie for the small and ordinary transactions of society should be encouraged; and as the deposite banks are not willing to receive such notes, it is the most equitable method to effect that object, and as the act of Congress does not expressly require the receipt of any such notes, it is in contemplation by this Department, after the 24th of March, 1835, to prohibit the receipt of such notes, and to extend the restriction on the receipt of bank notes, for it, to all of a less denomination than ten dollars.
