The following document has been handed to us for publication, by the Spanish Consul, in conformity to orders received by the general government of Mexico.

UNITED STATES OF MEXICO... National Palace, Mexico, May 15, 1836... The American operations under the orders of H. E. the general, president D. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna had marched upon Zacatecas in obedience to the supreme decree of the general government, against which the inhabitants of that city had revolted.

The troubles in the South will promptly be pacified, as the States of Zacatecas, their main dependence, is now pacified, so we may hope in a short time to see the blessings of general peace extended throughout the whole extent of the United States of Mexico.

On the 15th of April, the law of 25 millions was made the order of the day, after a discussion since the 9th. In connection with the 1st article of that law, General Valdez proposed an amendment, that the payment should be deferred till the American government gave satisfactory explanations of the president's message to the last Congress.
