Sir.—Having been verbelly notified by you on the 8th instant, of the appointment by the legislature of a joint committee, to examine into the affairs of this institution, I called a special meeting of the board yesterday. The legislature will perceive from the enclosed report, that the medical college has made great progress which may be attributed exclusively to the enterprise and zeal of the medical gentlemen who compose the faculty; that the number of students, now enjoying the advantages of a full course of lectures, in the various branches of medical science, amounts to upwards of thirty, from various states of the Union, and is daily increasing. There is perhaps no part of the Union where medical students reap so great advantages and here, in those branches which depead on practice and per ticularly surgical cases:

The undersigned need not say how important it is that those who are destined to profess the healing at should become acquainted with the diseases of the climate, as modified by local causes; and how deeply the public is interested in the establishment of a medical cal school, in which such advantages may be enjoyed in an eminent degree.

The future progress of the medical college of Louismans will depend in a great measure on the patronage of the legislature. The gentlemen composing the faculty have expended considerable sums in the purchase of apparatus and a chemical laboratory, but their private recourses are not sufficient to provide a suitable building in which the courses of lectures may be delivered.
