I have been deeply affected by the sentiments which France manifested towards my family, and thyself, when, at a moment, painful to memory, providence graciously preserved to me a life always devoted to the service of my country.

As expedition undertaken for the security of our possessions in Africa, has been conducted and accomplished as became the honor of France. I have seen with pride the heir of my family sharing the tatigues and dangers of our gallant soldery.

I have reason to congratulate myself on the state of our relations with European powers. Our intimate connexion with Great Britainsis drawn closer every day, and every thing pives the confidence that the peace we now enjoy will not be disturbed.

My Government continues its take on the Spanish Frontier, the proper measures for faithfully observing the provisions of the treaty of the 20th April, 1834. I pray earnestly for the internal tranquility of the Peninsula, and the ostablishment of the throne of Isabella II.

I regret that the treaty of the 4th July, 1831, with the United States of America gould not be carried into complete effect.
