It he Editors in the United States would publish the following facts, relative to the land offices in Texas, it will prevent persons from being swindled out of their morey, and do much good.

Three persons were commissioned to make deeds to estiters and cologies, all of whom kept their offices in this place, and nothing to prevent imposition was communicated to zach other whatever.

Those settlers who have families are entitled to one citio of land, equal to 4423 acres and a fraction; a single man to one fourth of a citie, on their becoming citizens of Texas: but there is nothing to prevent them from obtaining deeds for six or more cities of land, when only the first can be of any value. Ist. They can each obtain a deed from Goorge A. Nixon, who is commissioned to make deeds and put the colonists in possession of their lands, in Zavala's, Vehlein's and Burnet's grants. 2nd. It they have been in the country a few years, each can get a deed from Charles S Taylor, who is commissioned to make deeds and put the settlers in the possession of lands in the bounds of a certain district. 3 rdly. They can eace obtain a deed on the same sort of claim, from George W. Smyth, who is also authorised to make deeds, and put the settlers in the possession of lands within a district alloited to him. And then they can go to Austin's colony, Dewitt's colony, and Mixim's celony, and get a deed for land in each, and hy settling on the citic first obtained, they can send the titles of the other cities to different parts of the United States, and sell: them to the highest bidder, and the purchasers get no value for their money whatever.
