Circular—The government has received information that, in the United States of North America, meetings are called for the avewed purpose of getting up and fitting out expeditions against the Republis of Mexico, in order to send assistance to the rebels, loster the civil war, and inflict upon our country all the calamities by which it is followed. In the United States, our ascient ally expeditions are now erganized similar to that headed by the traitor Jose Antonio Mejia, and some have even set out for Texas. They have been furnished with every kind of ammunition, by means of which the revolted eclonists are enabled to resist and fight the nation from which they never have received but immense benefits. The government is also positively informed that these cates, condomned by the wisdem of the laws of the United States, are also reported by the general government, with which the best intelligence and the greatest harmony still prevail. However, as these adventurers and speculators have succeeded in escaping the penalties inflicted by the laws of their own country, it becomes necessary to adopt measures for their punishment. His excellency the president ad interim, anx ious to represe these aggressions which constitute notonly an offence to the sovereignty of the Mexican nattion, but also to an evident violation of internationalism as they are generally adopted, has ordered the following descrees to be enforced.

Ist. Foreigners landing on the coast of the republic or invading its territory by land, armed and with the intention of attacking our country, will be deemed pirates and dealt with as such, being citizens of no nation presently at war with the republic, and fighting under no recognized flag.

2nd. All foreigners who will import either by and erland, in the places occupied by the rebels, either same or ammunition of any kind for the use of them will be deemed pirates and punished as such.
