February.

He left Fort King in pursuit of the enemy, and took with him 8 days' provisions. In attempting to recross with nun o casy provisions. In attempting to recross the Withlacoochee, his progress was arrested by a body of Indians, amounting to about 1500—the force under General Gaines being 1100. That river is narrow, but deep and rapid. The contest across it conunued for 2 days, and on the 3d the American general retired backward, and threw up a breastwork. Ho then again advanced to the river with 200 men to skirmish with the enemy, and induce him to cross by his re-treat. This had the desired effect. On the evening of the 29th, the whole body of the Indians with their scattering squads crossed the river and attacked the Americans in their entremchments. The contest continued for two hours, during which Gaines slyed his adversary for two nours, during water Games piyed the serversary with trace chains from the artillery instead of bells, which literally moved them down. About 300 are said to have perished in this engagement—the Americans having lost one officer (Licutement Exact) killed I wounded, and about 10 privates killed.

The Indians encamped that night on the scene of action; and next day harmed in the forces of General Gains—who (heing almost destitute of privisions, and mable to send for succer lest his scouts should be cut off) was in rather as awkward predicament.
