With a view of assisting the delegation from Louisiana in obtaining an appropriation from congress for the improvement of the entrance to the Mississippi river, I addressed a report to the engineer-department in relation to the obsacles that nowlexist at the mouth of that river, to a facile navigation, and suggested the means of improvement.

In this report I referred to the examination and, report of Major Busson, surveyor and engineer of Louisiana, on the practicability of obtaining a greater depth of water by means of a lateral canal from the river to the Gult of Mexico, at a point opposite to Le Breton Island.

I have written to Major Buisson for a copy of his report, and truet to receive it by due course of mail, in time for the action of congress.
