Chemical Problem.—M Biot has proposed in one of the sittings of the French Academy of Sciences the following question to chymists. When crystals of pure tartaric acid are dissolved in different proport ons of water, at a temperature of from twenty-two to twenty-six degrees centifying and, are there, or are there not, in this aqueous state of solution, molecular properties depending on the proportions which constitute it? and if there are such, can the physical law be pointed out which will define or express them, for each given proportion of the two bodies? If this question should attract the attention, and lead to the researches of chymists, M Biot has no doubt that the results would produce some very remarkable consequences. While waiting for the labors of others, he has lodged a sealed solution of his chemical problem in the hands of the French Academy of Sciences, obtained by himself, and which will be opened at the first sitting in December.

Granting further powers to the police jury of the parishes of St Landry, Rapides and Avoyelles.

SECTION 1st. Be it enacted by the senset and House of Representatives of the Sixte of Louisinan in general assembly convened. That the police jury of the parishes of St Landry, Rapides and Avoyelles shall have and they are hereby invested with powers of alter or modify the road laws of the state as applicable to the said parishes, as to grant permission to the free-holders and taxable persons in any of the road districts in the said parishes, to keep up sind maintain in good order the public roads within their districtly working each on or across the front of his own land, and in a body on such parts of the road as may pass over the public lands, under such rules and ponsities as the said police jury may prescribe, whenever a majority of the freeholders and voters in such district shall petition the said police jury so to do.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc. That the said police jury of the parish of St Landry shall have further power, whenever they shall be requested thereto by the petition of a majority of the freeholders and voters of any road district in the said parish, to levy a tax on such road district, and expend the same in letting out or contracting for keeping up and maintaining in good order the guistic roads in such districts, for such length of time as may be agreed upon by said frecholders and voters, and said police jury.

Sec. 3: Re it further enacted, etc. That the said police jury of St Landry shell have power to ordain that every person who shall be adjudged to pay any fine of fines that the said jury may now lawfully impose upon the infraction of any of their lawful ordinance or ordinances, and who shall not have any property out of which such fine or fines may or can be collected, and who shall refuse or neglect to pay such fine or fines when lawfully called on so to do, shall be imprisoned if they tibresifer acquire any property, out of which the same may be made on a sent of feer folias.
