Mr Drar Srg.—Since I last wrote you from Bejar, the affairs of Texas have assumed an aspect which must not only awaken the bravest sympathies of the frie ads of constitutional liberty, in every clime, but act well for the prompt and efficient efforts of our devoted pariots now in the field, or all will be lost. We left Bejar, you may remember, with the flush of victor, yet glowing upon our cheeks, and the laurel yet unit aded upon our brows to seek new conquests at Ms tamotas; but searcely had we reached this place on our way thither, ere the apple of discord was raised among us, by several ambitious aspirants for the count of the army; and the dissentions arising from this cause have hitherto paralized all our efforts, and proved the ruin of one portion of our little army.

To put our present attitude in its true light, it is neces sary to recur 90 past transactions. When we arrived in the camp before Bejar, General Austin had just rettied, and the command had devolved upon General Edward Burleson, an honest, unassuming gentlemal.

A detachment of the Mexican army has, by an extraordinary movement, been united with the Indians of the north, who it is reported are 1500 strong; and unless timely succer is obtained, the country will be overun; and the depredations and horrows which were lately enacted in Florida, will now be removed to the western border of our happy land. Hundreds of families are rapidly fleeing down upon them; and all is confusion between here and San Augustine. Gov. Quitman, the noble and brave Quitman, who merely went to explore the country, and lay out the promised land, has heedlessly found himself and his handful of devoted adherents, hemmed in by the Mexicans on one side, and the cruel Indians on the other; and he is now rallying the scattered inhabitants and forming a rear guard, to protect the unfortunate women and children, who are herrying with all possible speed to the Sabine. Gen. Mason reached here by express last evening; and Gen Gaines, with just promptitude, has ordered 8 or 10 companies from this garrison to be on the line of march by 3 o'clock P M, to reach the Sabine as early possible.
