What has chiefly furnished them with food for reflection, and given them a general, although perhaps a superficial, knowledge of almost every subject?—the newspaper; that despised and insignificant messenger, bringing every day some new fact or some new idee, and thus adding by little and little to their mental stores, until they have accumulated to an extent for which the cause would have appeared at first inadequate.
