OBITUARY.

We stated in our paper of yesterday, that on Wednesday the Presidential Electors gave their votes for MARTIN VAN BUREN and RICHARD M. JOHNSON.—The same evening the Electors, with a large number of democratic citizens, assembled at the house of Col. G. S. Canonge, chairman of the democratic General Committee; and after passing some hours in the interchange of social and friendly feelings, they were waited upon by some thousands of democrats, accompanied by a number of Davis' men, who were present to witness the result of the election. The scenes were as great a number could be contained in the large room, partook of a very handsome repast, at which Col. Canonge presided. Many toasts were given, expressive of the satisfaction of the democratic party at the result of the late election, and of their confidence in the administration about to assume the government of the country, as well as respect and gratitude to that which is on the eve of retiring from office. After leaving Davis' house, the citizens dispersed into different parts of the city, with various bands of music. It is much to their credit, under all the circumstances, that not the slightest disorder took place, and the whole affair ended with the same harmony with which it began.
