PROM FLORIDA.

The steamboat *Charleston* arrived on the 18th from Charleston, from Port Nelson, having on board 100 passengers, of whom 60 were negroes, 40 Indians, 10 children, 10 women, and 10 men, and children, captured at Fort Mellon, on the 7th instant. The Indians had come in to receive the rations which it was the practice to distribute them, when Lieutenant H. Harvey learned the massacre of colonel Harvey's regiment, thought it right to take them prisoner. The prisoners will be detained at Castle Pinckney, until orders are received as to their fate.

INDIAN DIFFICULTIES.

From the Arkansas Star of the 9th we learn that another report had come in, that the red feudal Indians had captured 100 negroes, and it is hoped that war and rumors of war will suffice for the present to put their disturbances to rest. The Star complains strongly of the want of a due military force on the frontier, to keep the Indian tribes in check. At Fort Gilson, in the very mid of the frontier, the U. S. troops do not exceed *sixty hundred men*. They are surrounded by vast bodies of wild armed Indians.
